

BCW-8848/ /Llanelli

This area is far too close to Carmarthen to be included in the Llanelli constituency. The people living here don't use the same services as the people in Llanelli and would consider themselves to be part of Carmarthen. The constituency boundary needs to be further away from Carmarthen for the constituency to make sense as a cohesive entity.



the proposal to move Bangor into the Aberconwy constituency is deterimental to it"s position with Gwynedd county, Bangor has stronger links and shared post industrial problems with Caernarfon than Aberconwy, the move would create problems in that the majority of constituents are in the Conwy council area and their needs are radically different to Arfon withmajor differences in industry, language, culture and heritage.

Bangor and Bethesda are post industrial communities and have little in common with the tourism centric areas of Aberconwy.

As a Bangor citizen, I object to be represented by an Aberconwy member of parliament regardless of their political persuasions.

BCW-8850/ / Llanelli

The town of Ammanford should be included in the Llanelli constituency as opposed to the Caerfyrddin constituency as the people of Ammanford and Llanelli have far more in common than either of these towns has with Carmarthen.

Both of these town are post industrial towns the people living there would have similar concerns, whereas the caerfyrddin constituency is a more rural. Swapping the area around Carmarthen that is included in the Llanelli constituency for the area around Ammanford in the caerfyrddin constituency would result in more cohesive constituencies.

BCW-8851/ / Glasgow

Please change the name to Swansea North & Central. It rolls off the tongue so much better.

BCW-8852/ / Swansea

Pontardawe has absolutely no connection to Brecon and Radnorshire. It is a very poor fit. Brecon and Radnorshire is a very rural county and miles from the Pontardawe area whereas Neath is 5 miles away and Swansea 9 miles away. Consideration should be given to keep all the Swansea Valley areas together either in a Swansea Valley area or within part of Neath. Ystradgynlais could then be moved into this area together with Ystalyfera, Pontardawe and Clydach. Other areas that could be included are Morriston North and South and Birchgrove. Clase could also come into the valley and Morriston area and possibly Llansamlet or Dulais Valleys. All the valley commiunities Ystradgynlais, Ystalyfera, Pontardawe and Clydach are all in the Swansea Bay area to work rather than heading to Brecon and beyond.

This would keep or slightly extend local comprehensive school boundaries. The Dulais Valley would extend the pupils in Maesydderwen making that school more feasible. The distance to travel to school would be reduced for places like Crynant and Seven Sisters and keeping Birchgrove in the same area as Clydach would keep the same catchment area. Bringing in Clase and perhaps part of Llansamlet would keep the crrent catchment for Morriston.

The remaining areas in Neath could be looked at as an extended constituency together with Aberavon without adding Porthcawl in,



Neath Port Talbot as part of Brecon and Radnor? You are attempting to mix rural with industrial, Tory with Labour. Someone will lose out, the farming community needs the self-serving Tories whose ethos is with the employers and monied, the population densities of Neath Port Talbot need the understanding and compassion a Labour MP naturally has. I wonder if Gerrymandering is the ambition, water down the Labour strongholds.

BCW-8854/ Cardiff

Resident of Cardiff but born and raised outside Carmarthen.

It is evident that the town of Carmarthen has not been considered based on geography / identity, but has instead been used to shoehorn people into constituencies based solely on numbers. The fact that Pensarn, which anyone will tell you is a part of the town of Carmarthen, is within the Llanelli constituency is ridiculous. A number of Pensarn residents may never have set foot in Llanelli. How can they be given the same priority by an MP as someone from Llanelli town centre? Similar story at Nantycaws, where again residents identify with Carmarthen rather than Llanelli. How can Nantycaws be in Llanelli whilst Llanddarog and Porthyrhyd - further away from Carmarthen town - are in Carmarthen constituency? Some flexibility / discretion should be used in the boundaries at Carmarthen to ensure that areas are given appropriate coverage in an appropriate constituency. At the moment this plan for Carmarthen and surrounding areas is absurd.

BCW-8855/ / Carmarthen

Llangunnor, Nantycaws residents would describe themselves as being in Caerfyrddin/Carmarthen and wouldn't identify with Llanelli. Whilst it is to be commended that Caerfyrddin is now a seat I think it's really important such an integral part of the community of Carmarthen is not placed in the Llanelli constituency.

BCW-8856/		/ Cardiff
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I do not agree that the areas of Gwaun-cae-Gurwen and Lower Brynamman should be placed within the Brecon and Radnor constituency. Unlike much of B&R, these are not rural areas; they are post-industrial, straddling the cusp between rural Wales and industrial Wales. It strikes me, having grown up in this area, that the concerns of people in Gwaun-cae-Gurwen and Lower Brynamman will be markedly different to those of people living in Brecon, or Rhayader, for example.

My other pressing concern is around the Welsh language. Gwaun-cae-Gurwen and Lower Brynamman are strongholds of the language, whereas much of B&R is not. The language is part of the culture and identity of Gwaun-cae-Gurwen and Lower Brynamman, where in much of B&R it is not. I fear that placing them in a constituency where the language is less of a concern will mean a risk to the language and to the culture and identity of the area.

I have similar concerns for the areas of Pontardawe, Cwmllynfell, and Ystalyfera - essentially the whole section of B&R which appears to be some kind of panhandle surrounded by Caerfyrddin, Swansea Central and North, and Swansea East and Neath. It strikes me as odd, when many of these areas think of themselves as being in the upper Swansea valley, that they should be removed of their connection to Swansea and placed instead in a constituency whose principal areas are some distance away (with very limited transport infrastructure).

I would suggest and recommend further consideration be given to how this area should be treated. As a starting point, I would suggest that Gwaun-cae-Gurwen and Lower Brynamman (and arguably Cwmllynfell) be made part of Caerfyrddin; and the areas of Pontardawe and Trebanos be made part of Swansea Central and North; the areas of Allt-wen, Rhos, Godre'r Graig, and Ystalyfera be made part of Swansea East and Neath.

BCW-8857/ Penybont

Less elected MPs equals less representation for all of Wales. This is repression of Wales from Westminster, and will surely stoke the fire of independence? Treating Wales as less important than England is going to make the system that already feels skewed against the 'lesser partners' a cast iron reality.



Rhuthun is in the Vale of Clwyd, geographically, socially, culturally and historically connected with the rest of the vale. It is separated from communities to the East by the Clwydian Hills.

Putting Rhuthun in Delyn seems bizarre to say the least, showing a lack of understanding and appreciation of the local community.

Why not simply keep the Vale of Clwyd together? The resulting constituencies would be of slightly different sizes, but at least they would make sense geographically, socially, culturally and historically.



Aberdare and Merthyr have deep socioeconomic problems that requires individual attention. One size fits all approach will not help to solve these problems. The Cynon valley requires its own constituency.



Confused behind the reasoning for splitting the small village Pontrhydyfen between two constituencies. Would it really make that huge a difference in population to have the whole village within one constituency or the other?

Also, the name "Aberafan and Porthcawl" is sloppy.

BCW-8862 / Wrexham

Putting Bangor into Aberconwy mixes two very different constituencies. I see what you're doing - gerrymandering against young Welsh-speaking working class voters, to mix them in with the older English-speaking second home owners, diluting one with the other, to the latter's gain.

But then Westminster never was going to let Plaid Cymru keep its seats for long. This is still imperialism, and Wales is still a colony of England.

BCW-8864 / Mountain Ash

This is not a fair representation of the people of Mountain Ash and other areas. We are not part of Pontypridd. They are not even in the same valley. Mountain Ash would be better paced in the Cynon Valley and if needed to be places with somewhere else, Merthyr Tydfil as we already share lots together.

I live in Bangor and can see no justification for the city being split in half which will enviably mean it ends up underrepresented with Conwy based representation having very different priorities as it has very different position on tourism/ welsh speaking.

Compare this to the position on Ynys Mon - which despite being much smaller, gets full protection. Why don't the population of Bangor deserve the same respect.

BCW-8870 / Wrexham

The Exclusion of Brymbo, Minera, Tanyfron and Bwlchgwyn from the proposed Wrexham constituency (instead being included in Alyn and Deeside) makes very little sense and breaks up communities with for no apparent reason;

- -Coedpoeth is connected to Minera and they are a part of the same urban area (https://www.nomisweb.co.uk/reports/localarea?compare=W37000356)
- -Brymbo and Tanyfron are closely tied to Southsea which finds itself in the Wrexham constituency
- -Each of these villages are administered by WCBC, not Flintshire CC
- A majority of infrastructure in these villages was made to facilitate transport into and out of Wrexham and for transport between eachother; not into Deeside and the Flintshire area

BCW-8871 / Haverfordwest

Putting Solva and St David's in a Ceredigion Preseli ward will limit our influence on local matters, it will cause a significant disconnect from centralized local government and also isolate our communities. I would argue that the mid and south Pembs boundary should include the peninsula region.

BCW-8872/ Denbigh

Bore da,

I am disappointed to see yet again the lack of consideration being given to *types* of communities that MPs are supposed to be representing as part of this boundary commission review.

I am unhappy with the idea that all constituencies must be of equal size in terms of number of constituents per constituency. Whilst I accept this may bring fairer representation in urban areas, rural areas both within Wales but also as evidenced in Scotland and non-urban areas in England stand to lose out significantly.

I do accept that the consultation may be beyond the point where constituent quotients can be argued, however I would like to make the case for parliamentary boundaries to be split in a different way.

Yet again in North Wales we see several constituencies which encompass quite large geographic areas each and it is my opinion that these do not give due consideration to the needs of residents (and therefore the effectiveness of the MP to adequately represent them).

My personal view is there should be two or three narrow constituencies north of the A55 corridor which gives MPs the option to specialise in tackling issues such as ageing well in Wales, County Lines drug issues and urban poverty - these issues affect all of the biggest towns from the border with England as far as Bangor (well, and Holyhead, but that's a protected constituency).

Having one or two much larger constituencies covering rural Wrexham, Flintshire and Denbighshire and rural Conwy and all of Gwynedd apart from Bangor would ensure that MPs in that area are better equipped to understand issues relating to agriculture, rural poverty, rural infrastructure and transport concerns and the Welsh Language - which is at risk of getting steamrollered when lumped in with predominantly anglicised coastal communities where there is little understanding of and even less appetite to learn the Welsh language. Time and again we see MPs with little or no Welsh ability and evidenced of little or no time spent learning Welsh, elected from coastal towns and as a result of this, rural Welsh-speaking communities struggle to identify with their local representative (and likewise, MPs cannot be expected to fully grasp issues in an area they have no experience of living in).

Even 5 miles south of the A55 can, in places, be like living in a completely different world.

From Flint to Conwy is almost one continuous urban development. Certainly between Prestatyn and Pensarn only signage demarcates that you have crossed

town and county boundaries.

Rural towns and villages are separated by literal miles of largely unoccupied land, including agricultural land, mountains, moorlands and other hills like the Clwydian Range. As evidenced by the "stay local" lockdown during the Covid-19 pandemic, rural communities experienced significantly different challenges to those who lived in the coastal towns and had good access to a range of goods and services.

Expecting three or four MPs to specialise in such a vast range of issues, for the sake of drawing the boundaries a slightly different way and supporting MPs to have a much narrower focus would in my view allow MPs to serve their constituents better and in turn would give constituents more confidence to vote because manifestos for these communities would be more likely to reference specific concerns.

Please, please consider the types of communities in your proposed constituencies and group communities together so that they can be better represented.

BCW-8873 / Newport

This constituency makes much more sense from a regional planning perspective. Aberdare and Merthyr are in the same health board and police force. This will make regional working easier to undertake for the benefit of all consituents

BCW-8874 / Merthyr Tydfil

I support the proposal to align Merthyr and Aberdare as a single constituency. This makes sense on geographical and political lines.

BCW-8875 / Pontyclun

I believe that the interests of my community, that is the streets of Coed Mieri, Llyn On, Meadow Way, Meadow Drive and Meadow View within the CF72 postcode would be best served being part of the Cardiff West consistency rather than Rhondda as these draft plans show.

This is because the village of Pontyclun falls within Cardiff West and as an estate Pontyclun is the village we are attached to and use the facilities of. Our kids go to Pontyclun Primary/Y Pant, we use Pontyclun train station, we shop and socialise on Pontyclun high street... in short our lives are attached to Pontyclun and we all say that we live in Pontyclun.

So being in a separate constituency to our main village reduces our representation on issues effecting Pontyclun continuing to create a detrimental effect on us residents in the above listed streets.

This change has already been proposed as part of the Local Boundary Review.

Please could this be reconsidered.

BCW-8876 / Presteigne

I support proposed boundary changes.

I do feel that there is an unjust balance between the predominantly large valley representation to that of Mid Wales.

That is also apparent in General Elections and those for Welsh Assembly

BCW-8877 / Cardiff

The proposed boundary changes and reduction of Welsh MPs by nearly a quarter is extremely concerning to me, a Welsh citizen.

Already under represented in Westminster, Wales will now be almost completley silent and will not have a sufficient number of MPs to to represent the population of Wales.

Regardless of the movement of boundaries, the removal of Welsh MPs from Westminster is completley shocking to me, who already feels completley disconnected and voiceless in Westminster.

It is completley undemocratic to make such a severe removal of Welsh MPs. Wales already largely votes against Westminster trends and often ends up with a Westminster government that was not votes for by the Welsh people. The removal of Welsh MPs will make this even more severe.

It is such a danger that I believe democracy will be almost, if not completley voided in my country

BCW-8878/ / Newport

I think the river makes a better boundary, but with much stricter requirements now in place I fully accept being transferred from one Newport constituency to the other. My issues are more about the lack of connection to the Senedd's established political regions as many of the proposed constituencies now cross those boundaries.

BCW-8879 / Ruthin

The boundary between Delyn and Clwyd is completely arbitrary and splits residents of the Denbighshire in half. The Clwydian range forms a natural boundary which should be followed. There are strong links between Ruthin and Denbigh - these, along with the other communities in the Vale of Clwyd should not be split. It is completely unreasonable to separate Ruthin from Pwll Glas, Clocaenog, and Graig fechan. It is also unreasonable to separate Denbigh from Llandyrnog and Bodfari. These boundaries are completely artificial and disregard the communities in the Vale of Clwyd, the principal council border between Denbighshire and Flintshire, local transport links, as well as the natural Geography of the area. The proposed boundary can only be described as explicit gerrymandering. Splitting Denbighshire completely in half will materially impact local communities, the provision of local services, and transport links.

BCW-8880/ / Pontypool

I note your comment 'the constituencies in Wales must reduce from 40 to 32'. Why 'must'? Supposedly, so that constituencies are equal and votes count the same. But this is palpably not so! Votes do not count the same under our present voting system. The boundary changes do not solve the problem of votes being unequal. Only proportional representation can do that. If we had PR then we wouldn't need to tinker with boundaries and all votes would count equally.

BCW-8881 / Undy, Caldicot

I do not believe that the redrawn constituency that removes Magor/Undy/Rogiet and Caldicot from the Newport East area into the Monmouthshire area is beneficial to the electorate, and those areas should remain within Newport East.

Magor/Undy, Rogiet and Caldicot are all on the M4 corridor and the needs for infrastructure transportation along that route, either by road or rail, are conducive to the needs of all areas along the east-west M4 corridor, and not as directly linked to the needs of those across the north-south transit area across the wider Monmouthshire constituency.

Might I be so bold to suggest a certain aspect of gerrymandering is occurring here, to reduce the majority in long held Labour seat of Newport East, with the predominately Conservative held Monmouthshire, which is in no way in the best interest of the people.

BCW-8882/ / Bwlchgwyn

You claim to give regard to local ties and local Governement boundaries yet Brymbo, Coedpoeth, Bwlchgwyn and other villages within Wrexham County Council are excluded from the Wrexham constituency. We are also with 5 miles of Wrexham. Under your proposals we are in Alyn and Deeside. I feel no connection to Buckley or Shotton. I feel more connection (although a low level) to Llandegla. Your proposals make no sense.

BCW-8883 / / Caernarfon

It is unthinkable that the city of Bangor is going to be separated out into two separate Constituencies. The city including Penrhosgarnedd should have one MP. To split it would mean two MPs representing the same city resulting in unnecessary confusion and duplication. It would be less disruptive and more logical for it to go to Dwyfor Meirionnydd

as it contains the Police HQ, Courts, Hospital, and all the other public services used by residents for which they would want to address issues with their MP. By separating it out as proposed no thought has gone into geography, adjacent wards, communities and services or otherwise too much common sense has been sacrificed to fit in with the voter's headcount in which case consideration should be made to areas such as Towyn and Bala moving into Southern constituencies given Towyn's proximity to Aberwystwyth etc.

The already meagre voice of the Welsh electorate is being effectively silenced in favour of the English majority - this they've (the English parliament) made a law to ensure happens.

The boundary change moving Llanbradach, located 2 miles from the centre of Caerffili is a joke. The County Borough we live in is Caerffili, but now that's being hived off to become part of Newport.

I object to both the boundary change and the removal of 8 Welsh MPs (whether their party mouthpieces who aren't worth their expenses, never mind their salary or not). The voice of Wales is effectively being silenced.

I live 5 miles from the centre of Wrexham.

I pay my rent and Council Tax to Wrexham County Borough Council, yet this proposal aligns a sizeable chunk of SW Wrexham with Newtown in Powys, 45 miles away. Logic and fairness dictates that the proposed Wrexham constituency encompasses the whole of Wrexham County Borough.

The communities of Pen-y-Cae. Ruabon, Cefn Mawr etc deserve better. Please reconsider.

BCW-8887 / Brynaman

How can Cwmgors, GCG, Lower Brynaman, and Tai'rgwaith be associated with Powys? There is no link to these areas, if anything there is more association with Carmarthenshire. To go into Powys, constituents of the above localities would have to travel through Carmarthenshire, then again NPT, then Carmarthenshire and then into Powys. So would feel quite disjointed from a new Powys constituency. Our postal address is Ammanford.

BCW-8888/ Tregaron

Firstly I have zoomed in but still don't see existing boundaries.

I do not see why Ceredigion should be enlarged to Ceredigion and Preseli. Ceredigion is a rather special county - it is busily and sustainably agricultural and our farmers should not be outnumbered by other concerns such as tourism. I am unsure of the consequences of this extension but feel that it will be a far more difficult job for county councillors to stay in touch with its grass-roots base.

Especially the existing policies regarding the use of holiday homes and empty properties bought on a speculative basis would be difficult to maintain and these policies are popular in the existing county.

I seriously believe this is a proposal which is aimed at gentrification of our rural population and intended to promote the election prospects of the right wing.



BCW-8890 / Ruthin

It doesn't really make sense for Ruthin, geographically located in the Vale of Clwyd, to be grouped with a constituency that is mostly located outside of the Vale of Clwyd and dominated by post-industrial coastal towns.

Our economics are fundamentally different to those of post-industrial towns which require a completely different strategy and far more public investment. Grouping our representation with places such as Mold, Deeside and Prestatyn all but guarantees that their investment priorities will be placed above ours, and those priorities are not at all similar. Our representation in Cardiff and Westminster would be dismal.

We are a rural town, and our demographics and priorities are more similar to places like Denbigh, Llangollen and Corwen; surely it makes more sense to be represented in the same constituency as these? That way we will actually have meaningful representation at the national level, rather than playing second fiddle to towns and communities that bear little resemblance to ours

BCW-8891 / Pontyclun

We've known for a long time that Cardiff was creeping Westward but the general local consensus was that it would stop at the A4119. Brynsadler and Pontyclun have been Mid Glamorgan/ Rhondda Cynon Taf and this change cuts up the unitary authority area with even the local comprehensive Y Pant being split off. It would make more sense to have Brynsadler and Pontyclun remain with Talbot Green (shares Y Pant school) in the Pontypridd (or even the Rhondda constituency with Llanharry and Llanharan). The urban sprawl of Cardiff West is out of control and needs to have a line drawn along the A4119. It shouldn't be making its way further Westward than M4 J34. Likewise south of the M4 in our area has generally been felt as the Vale of Glamorgan as it now is. They would make good boundaries for a parliamentary constituency in our area.

BCW-8892 / Jangor

As a lifelong resident of Bangor I find the proposal to carve my home city of Bangor in half absolutely ludicrous. How on earth do you expect this city to function if it is part of two separate local authorities with different rules, policies.

Bangor must be kept as a whole in either one county or the other. You cannot allow this madness to happen

BCW-8893 / Llangollen

It makes very little sense to me to have Llangollen in the same constituency as Welshpool and Newtown, given how difficult it is to travel between them, especially if you don't have a car.

Even with a car, it's quicker to go through England!

I worry it will lead to Llangollen (and environs) being disregarded or poorly represented at the Westminster parliamentary level.



Splitting the city of Bangor like this is so colossally short-sighted I can't even think of a polite way of describing it. What on earth?

Coupled with the inclusion of this Plaid/Labour supporting city in the safe Conservative seat of Aberconwy, it just looks like blatant gerrymandering to me.

I strongly urge the Commission to reconsider this decision.



As a resident of the rural village of Magor, Monmouthshire, I fully support the realignment of the constituency of Monmouthshire to include Magor.

I truly believe that I will be better represented in Parliament by the Monmouthshire MP, rather the MP for the urban area of Newport East

Keeping this area (south of the railway line) as part of Rumney and not adding it to the South Cardiff and Penarth constituency has a problem.


As mentioned on page 6 of the inital proposals report, constituencies should not have "detached parts".

Based on the map on page 45, I challenge the Boundary Commission to walk from Trowbridge to the rest of the constituency without entering Rumney and without getting wet.

The Trowbridge community is effectively an island away from Splott, as the only shared border is the Bristol Channel. (see attached image with this boundary highlighted in red.)

The area in question is primarily industrial and would make little impact on the numbers of voters within the two directly impacted constituencies.

The industrial park is already split with part of it in Rumney and part in Trowbridge

BCW-8897 / Penarth

Could we please be re-joined with our county, the Vale of Glamorgan. Penarth has very little in common with the distant and far eastern reaches of Cardiff, almost into Newport. We would like to be be represented in common with our near neighbouring county town of Barry. The Western Vale could then be placed into the Bridgend constituencies reflecting the closer cultural and economic ties that exist in the Western Vale.

By grouping the Central and Eastern Vale together the correct number of voters issue is addressed with 4 settlements (Barry, Penarth, Dinas Powys and Sully- circa 100,000 residents) included in the same constituency and under the same county council. These town/villages are barely barely two miles from each other at the extreme with bordering boundaries.



This is considered locally to be lisvane cardiff, not lisvane Caerphilly.

Not many know that lisvane is actually across two constituencies, and was only figured out when researched.

The boundaries used to be different and there is historic information and geographic boundaries around this area. If visited, you will realise that lisvane Caerphilly only looks out over lisvane and cardiff, not Caerphilly. Major road links are from cardiff not Caerphilly (only country roads from Caerphilly).

Historically, The local community hall was gifted to the lisvane cardiff community by the occupants of the mount rudry road, whose outbuildings has now been split into multiple residences. All of which was considered cardiff historically.

Please review this decision and possibly change the boundaries to include the houses along rudry road, which is less then 10 houses, having minimal impact but a considerate local impact.



Please label the area including Porthcawl as South Glamorgan, or something classy, not Aberavon Porthcawl which is so unattractive a name and terribly unimaginative.

BCW-8900 / Newport

This is a stupid idea and politically motivated. If you want everyones vote to mean the same then you need to reform the system, abolish first past the post and implement some form of Proporsional Representation. Wales voice is already overshadowed by the larger voice of England and having less seats will only make this worse. This proposal is all about merging existing Labour seats for less MP's. What would have been 4 seats in Blaenau Gwent, Caerphilly, Merthyr, and Newport East(all Labour) become 3.

At this moment in time I vote in an area predominantly Labour, it doesn't matter if I decided to vote for anyone else because where I live will alway be Labour. Therefore my vote means nothing. It is the same across the whole UK, unless you live in a swing constituency your vote means absolutely nothing if it goes against the majority in your area. PR or AR at least means my vote is considered and everyone's vote is of the same value regardless of where they live. This is just an exercise in maintaining the status quo for those in power and making it harder for anyone else to get them out of government.

The proposal for Blaenau Gwent and Rhymney is particularly stupid. The constituency is nearly spilt in 2 by Islywn, what effects Blaenau Gwent doesn't effect Rhymney. It's a completely different valley. At no point do I visit Rhymney or New Tredegar, and I doubt very much that people there visit Abertillery or Blaina. All you have done is taken the poorer areas of what is currently Caerphilly and merged them with Wales poorest area in Bleanau Gwent.

BCW-8901 / Montgomery

To whom it may concern,

As someone that grew up in the local area, and someone that went to secondary school in both Ruthin and Denbigh, I find the idea that they will be in different constituencies problematic, and a poor representation of day to day life in the area.

A considerable number of people travel between the two towns every day due to their proximity, and the local area's share many amenities between each other (there is a Tesco in Ruthin, but Denbigh has the Morrisons). Similarly, most of the roads in the area travel north/south, so things that happen in either Ruthin, Denbigh, or further north in St Asaph tend to affect each of the other towns (they share the same road, river and in the distant past, railway), so are frequently affected by the same flooding or congestion.

Even ignoring the economic arguments, the Vale of Clwyd itself is geographically bounded by the North/South running ranges of hills on its East and West flanks. Because of this, most people living in the vale conduct the majority of their day to day lives in the vale itself, as it avoids having to cross the hills in places such as Clwyd Gate.

It thus makes geographic sense to have Mold, being in a different valley, not in the same constituency as Ruthin, and instead would make much more sense to see Ruthin in the same constituency as Denbigh and St Asaph.

I should note this North/West divide doesn't really hold up on the coast though. This is primarily due to the A55 and old coast road, which has seen the coastal towns of the Denbighshire and Flintshire tend to be much better connected with each other East/West (though this highlights the fact that Prestatyn is in a different constituency from Rhyl and Rhuddlan as a bit odd as well).

I do understand that it is a very difficult task to separate these rural area's roughly equally by population, but to someone living in the upper Clwyd valley, it would make a lot more sense to talk to one single MP about jobs and grievances, rather than split such a connected valley in two.

Instead, if I could be so bold, it may make more sense to include Ruthin, and all the upper Clwyd valley in the new Clwyd constituency (places like Bodfari, Gellifor and Llandyrnog), instead swapping them with Delyn for places to the north of the A55 (such as Rhyl and Rhuddlan). This way the new border between Clwyd and Delyn would follow the local geography considerably better, and likely considerably more intuitive for those actually living in the Vale of Clwyd, who under the current proposals would not actually be within the constituency of Clwyd.

BCW-8903 / Pontyclun

This village has been very well served by RCT in the past and I don't believe that Cardiff West control will bring any benefits.

One example: RCT waste collection is vastly superior to that of Cardiff



I live in the Maindy area of Cardiff, which is the southern-most part of Cardiff North according to the current and new boundaries

I find it slightly odd that we aren't part of Cardiff Central, because there are a lot of people around me who are either students or who walk into the city centre. My nearest train station is Cathays, and I have far more shared interests with people across the border into Cathays than the north of the constituency, given needs for active travel, prosperity of the university and city centre, etc.

I'd suggest having more, smaller, Cardiff Central equivalents, rather than putting my in a constituency that also includes the eastern bit of Taff's Well, which is over three hours walk away, which is quite odd for an urban seat.



I believe this to be a very sensible change to the boundary of the Neath constituency.



I am glad that our constituency will become part of Torfaen for two reasons.. Monmouth has more voters than Torfaen, and having a part of Cwmbran outside Torfaen is an anomaly.



Dreadful changes which tear up the communities of Bangor

BCW-8908 / Bangor

Moving Dyffryn Ogwen into a constituency that will probably administered from Llandudno or Colwyn Bay is crazy. The last reorganisation, where we moved into Arfon works well and is logical geographically.

I object to this boundary as it severs the penrhosgarnedd area from the rest of Bangor, although these community's are administered separately at a local government level the cultural ties between them and close alignment on issues of political concern make the purposed boundary change a sharp dividing line between two communities that ought to be kept whole

BCW-8910 / CARDIFF

One of the primary aims of this review was to ensure a proportionate reduction in the volume of MPs in Westminster, reducing the associated costs. Under these proposals, the net total MPs remains the same with a redistributed number of MPs across the nations. Wales and Scotland see a reduction in the number of MPs representing them whereas England sees an increase. This dilutes the voices of the nations within Westminster further increasing the democratic deficiency. The HoC already attracts criticisms for being English centric and not addressing the needs of the nations (and to similar extent outside of the M25). This proposal increases those criticisms further. The Westminster Parliament model requires holistic restructuring, not a simple redistribution exercise to ensure genuine representation of each of the nations (and similarly the English regions) and to ensure that the Government (whichever - I say this from a non-political perspective) can truly be held to account. There is a fundamental democratic deficiency in this proposal which necessitates further consideration.

BCW-8911 / Swansea

Waste of time and money. What till this move achieve? And more importantly how much is in going to cost me in a rise in my council tax?!?

BCW-8912 / Prestatyn

I want to congratulate everyone who developed this proposal. I played around with the numbers myself and know how difficult it is to come up with something workable within the parameters given.

Of course, it is not ideal but there are no ideal options, and every other option I have heard about or come up with myself are worse

BCW-8913 / Nelson

The proposed change to constituencies in my area neglects local peoples and organisations relationships and histories with surrounding areas and completely disregards what schools the local people attend and the different people from these schools they interact with that strengthen the ties between towns and villages

BCW-8914 / Hengoed

This is a disgrace. A way to reduce the number of Labour MP's in Parliament. I totally disagree with the proposal.

BCW-8915 / / Wrexham

I think the proposal for the new Glyndwr and Montgomery seat is deeply flawed.

Firstly the geographical region is too large. People will not feel effectively represented by one person trying to cover such a large area. With Parliament sitting four days a week that leaves precious little time for one person to get round an area that is large and does not have good transport links.

I also feel the comments that these areas share the same rural characteristics is not entirely true. Settlements such as Penycae, Ruabon, Cefn Mawr, Acrefair and Chirk are more urban than rural in nature and often join up with each other to create town size settlements. I think these communities have been simply bolted on to get the numbers up to make this new seat work on paper. These villages are part of the Wrexham area and should be included in that constituency.

Voter turnout is already declining in this country, redrawing boundaries in such an unfathomable mathematical driven exercise will only disenfranchise and confuse people.

BCW-8916 / Caerphilly

I do not wish for Maesycwmmer to return to Islwyn constituency. We have done far better, with better resource and representation as part of Caerphilly. We were largely ignored as part of Islwyn. These boundary remappings seem half baked at best, and only consider number of voters, not area and diversity of people etc. Also seems designed to create further voting bias to prevent change.

BCW-8917 / Porthcawl

I fully support this move - it represents many of the concerns that people have had about disparities between the two counties and the preference to be in one rather than the other

It is absolutely rediculous to propose that Swansea Valley join Brecon and Radnorshire - they are completely different areas and it does not make sense that areas of NPT join a Powys constituency.

BCW-8919 / Mountain Ash

I strongly object to the proposals for the lower half of the Cynon Valley to be seperated from the upper half and merged with Pontypridd, a constituency it has little in common with, and I object to the loss of the Cynon Valley as a community (which by definition starts at Abercynon with the confluence of the Cynon River and the Taff, extending up to Hirwaun), Cynon having every bit as strong an identity as that of the Rhondda, however for some reason the Rhondda isn't proposed to be split up? I can understand the Taff Ely areas of RCT being reclassified as these don't have as strong an identity as the Cynon or Rhondda Valleys, but if the Rhondda is to remain, then so should the Cynon Valley.

The above having said, I agree with reincorporating Glyncoch and Cilfynydd back into Pontypridd constituency as these are strongly associated with the town of Pontypridd itself, likewise reincorporation of Ynysybwl and Coed y Cwm also makes sense given its geography which is seperate from the Cynon Valley, however I see no synergy between Abercynon, Mountain Ash or Aberaman with Pontypridd, and would worry that these being amongst some of the poorest communities of South Wales, our voices would be lost amongst the more affluent communities south, in particular Church Village, Llantrisant, Llantwit Fardre, Ton-teg and Talbot Green etc. I would see more synergy in incorporating the lower communities of the Rhondda such as Cymmer, Trehafod and Trebannog etc. into Pontypridd rather than splitting the Cynon Valley, as Porth is widely considered the gateway to the Rhondda, so would be quite legitimate to incorporate anything south of this into Pontypridd.

The lower Cynon Valley is both geographically and politically remote from Pontypridd. If the Cynon Valley has to be split, then it would make more sense to also split Merthyr and merge Aberdare with Merthyr Tydfil town and northern wards, and to merge the lower Cynon Valley with lower Merthyr (Merthyr Vale, Bedlinog, Treharris, Nelson etc.), as this area doesn't have particularly close ties with the town of Merthyr itself, and are fairly close in geography and character to the lower Cynon Valley, with significant travel between the two areas.

BCW-8920 / Swansea

the entire Trowbridge ward of Cardiff South and Penarth is geographically isolated from the rest of the constituency by the Rumney ward of Cardiff Central. this obviously disenfranchises residents of the Trowbridge ward

BCW-8921 / Bangor

How on earth can you justify splitting Bangor jn two? We are one city, and a small one at that! How can we have the boundary lines splitting us in half? The needs of Bangor citizens are regularly ignored and the problems we have here are rarely addressed. Put the whole of Bangor in one or the other please. Its just

Common sense!



I personally believe that the name Dwyfor Meirionydd, is a little misleading and perhaps this constituency should be known simply as Gwynedd as it contains nearly the entire county of Gwynedd



the name Brecon and Radnor is misleading, especially as Brecon and Radnor are not the largest towns in this constituency. A better name would be Brecknockshire, Radnorshire and Cwmtawe as it includes the entire constituency in the name for the first time.

The proposed constituency is far too large to be represented by one Mp. From the top corner in which I reside to the bottom, it would take more that 1 hr 30 to travel due to the poor infrastructure within wales. In this instance how would the MP remain accessible for their constituents?

ABSOLUTELY RIDICULOUS including porthcawl, pyle, Kentish hill etcetera in with aberavon ABSOLUTELY no historical or social links boundaries should remain with Bridgend as that is where the ties are

BCW-8926 / Pontypridd

The proposed Pontypridd Constituency seems to stretch all the way from the northern edge of Cardiff to halfway up the Cynon Valley, meaning that the Lower Cynon Valley is cut off from the Upper, even though this is one valley, and logically, one constituency. It appears that the aim in Wales, is to reduce the number of traditional Labour held seats, thus helping the incumbent Conservative Government to stay in power. BCW-8927 / / Wrexham

In relation to our community ties we have always been living within the city of Swansea; our children go to a primary and secondary school and the feeder schools are within Swansea so this would impact their choice of schools when the boundary changes. I'm addition our son has played football since he was 5 years olds and plays for a football team which will be out of the boundary which will mean he will no longer be able to play for that team because he will be outside of the Swansea area. Our son has anxiety and change has a huge detrimental impact on him and I know 100% he would no longer play football because he would find it too difficult to adjust to a new team. We also have social care services which would have to change from Swansea to Neath port Talbot which again would have a huge impact on services. We are entrenched within the local history of Swansea area and moving the boundary will negatively impact so many residents. Please please reconsider this proposal.

BCW-8929 / Llandysul

There are many inhabitants of Carmarthen town who will not be in the new Carmarthenshire constituency.

This does not make sense.



The new proposal for the reduction and combination of constituencies in Wales is disastrous. It is unfair to the people of Wales to reduce the voice we have in Westminster from 40 down to 32. I feel that this will have a negative impact on decisions made in Westminster that could affect Wales. Wales deserves better!



I am not happy for this change.

I believe strongly that we in the whole of the city of Bangor should remain a part of arfon, and not Aberconwy. And should most certainly not be split by electoral counties. BANGOR is part of Gwynedd and Gwynedd County Council and should remain in all capacities.

The boundary should only start as it is currently, at Llanfairfechan.



Incorporating Eastside including St Thomas into Neath will denigrate the history of the area which is part of the Copper industry of Swansea. This history forms an intrinsic part of Swansea's major redevelopment'Copr bay' and our area falls into the SA1 area. This will affect education, house prices and identity. I am Swansea born and bred not Neath and I am unhappy for my home to be displaced into a Neath constituency as it will have a major affect on the culture of our area. It will also increase Council Tax prices. I completely object to this.



The proposed changes are a shameless display of gerrymandering

BCW-8934/ Wrexham

This shows a total lack of awareness of community identity by the boundary commission. Ponciau, penycae, acrefair, rhosllanerchrugog and Ruabon should all be in the same voting district.



This is ridiculous and such a waste of funds,

Also as a adoptive mum I find this upsetting I'm in the process of adopting a 2nd child who can't be adopted in adopt my new daughter so you need to think about the impact this is having!

Absolutely disgusting and thought up by a bunch of people who have no idea the impact this will cause!!!



I am concerned about the split of Aberdare from the rest of the Cynon Valley. There are no services, for example, Leisure, between Abercynon and Aberdare and the biggest town in the area is Aberdare.

The vast majority of people living in Mountain Ash utilise Aberdare as their predominant town. This is the same for those anywhere North of Mountain Ash.

If there were issues with for example, Leisure facilities in Aberdare there would be an extremely convoluted process of raising these as we would not have an MP in the area who is accountable to us for these.

Also, I am very concerned about the impact of this split and it crossing local council boundaries. Both councils are operated in completely different ways and have entirely different cultures. This would be a very difficult job for all MP's. As someone living in Mountain Ash but working in Merthyr these differences are very stark.

Finally, if the proposals are agreed I feel strongly that the names need to be assessed. Mountain Ash is not Pontypridd and I find this quite offensive. Names should be neutral and not attached to any particular electoral ward or town.

BCW-8937/ Bangor

Penrhosgarnedd has, over recent years become increasingly sub-urban in nature. It looks, and feels like a part of the wider spread of Bangor. I understand that the current proposals for reorganisation of local government boundaries suggest including Penrhosgarnedd in a realigned Bangor ward. It would seem sensible for the Parliamentary boundary to echo this change. I would suggest that the edge of the proposed new constituency follow the line of the A55, west of Penrhosgarnedd, to include it - along with the rest of Bangor - in Aberconwy, should the proposed changes go ahead.

BCW-8938/ Swansea

The proposal to include Swansea East in with Neath makes absolutely no sense at all, I understand the need to balance numbers of constituents but Swansea East hasa huge link to Swansea Central, the rich history of the area including the docks, Kilvey hill and surrounding areas would be far better served with Swansea Central who have a far more direct relationship with us. To simply have used the river as theboundary is incredibly poor when we look and it feels like we are a little add on to the Neath constituency when we are so far removed from it. We would end up being a poor relation and an afterthought in the constituency. It doesn't look right. It doesn't feel right. It doesn't appear to have had any thought in it beyond an easy carve up tobalance the numbers.

BCW-8939/ Bridgend

I am writing to strongly object to the proposal to take Bryntirion, Broadlands and Laleston ward out of Bridgend constituency.

We are part of Bridgend town, with strong links to the Bridgend constituency, whilst being a separate ward we are intrinsically linked through schools, work and recreation.

It is absolutely absurd that a suburb of Bridgend is moved to an alternative parliamentary constituency yet separate towns which have more historical and community links with Aberavon remain within the Bridgend constituency.

I would strongly urge you to reconsider whether it would be more appropriate to consider moving maesteg into aberavon, and leaving Bridgend town as a whole entity within the changed Bridgend constituency.



Is this the Welsh government? Keep Bridgend separated



How can you split up the area covering broadlands and laleston? Don't agree with this carving up of a county at all!



Broadlands, Porthcawl and laleston are part of Bridgend, services are provided in Bridgend. Stupid to move them over to another area. All of Bridgend boundaries should remain together.



The proposed constituency is completely ridiculous from the perspective of the wards of Corwen and Llandrillo. These areas have no geographical or historical connection with the towns in Montgomeryshire or Wrexham's industrial villages.

Children in the area attend secondary school in Bala (and some in Llangollen) and compete against and socialise with children from schools in Meirionnydd. We spend our leisure time in Penllyn, Ardudwy or the Llŷn Peninsula. Historically, the area is part of the old county of Meirionnydd.

Dwyfor Meirionnydd would be a much more natural home for the Cynwyd, Llandrillo and Corwen area. That is our historical area. That is where many of our children are educated. That is where the roads and public transport go. The TrawsCymru T3 bus travels through Bala to Dolgellau and Barmouth. We do not have the same connections with Montgomeryshire!



It seems as though Westminster are once again trying to reduce Welsh say as much as possible. I couldn't imagine not having Caerphilly as my own constituency. Is there any benefit from this for us? It doesn't seem as though it ever is at all for Wales.

BCW-8945/ Pontardawe

I live half a mile from Swansea County border, on the very edge of Neath Port Talbot, under the Neath constituency.

Under this proposal my MP will be the same one that covers all of mid Wales, as far up as Rhayader!

The people in my area do not share the same concerns as the rural communities of mid Wales. The population is not evenly distributed and the economic needs of either end of the proposed constituency are polar opposites. Culturally they are different, this is a traditional, Welsh speaking area, the same cannot be said of the rest of the proposed constituency.

I'd like to know the justification for drawing up this particular boundary, it's bizarre.

Also, south Wales is known as a strong Labour supporting area, under these proposals the party would lose parliamentary seats. Very convenient for the current ruling party...

Surely the most obvious changes would be to combine Swansea East and West, and combine the numerous valley seats such as Cynon, Islwyn etc? I understand it's to do with numbers but other factors must be considered.

I believe that dividing Bridgend in half like this will only serve to disillusion more people from the local politics. It has always been commendable that Bridgend was the same seat boundaries for the Senedd and the parliamentary constituency. By changing the name of the seat newly registered voters will be confused by the different name and to divide such a close knit community down the middle will only lead to greater voter apathy amongst young people especially in areas such as Broadlands, Cefn Glas and Laleston whose communities have no association to Porthcawl or Aberafan. I believe this is a negative move and if an arrangement that didn't involve splitting Bridgend in half would be a far better solution for ensuring voter turnout continues to remain at 65-70%.

At the very least constituencies should be based on actual population size NOT registered voters (aka electors as they are cryptically called in your description). This is nothing more than gerrymandering.



If Arfon and Dwyfor Meirionydd must be amalgamated then fair enough, however to shave off Bangor/Bethesda is an absolute scandal.

This proposal goes against every single point of consideration you claim to have taken into account. Geographically, historically and economically Bangor is tied to the old slate quarrying towns of Arfon, far more than the South East of Meirionydd, which has much closer ties to Denbighshire.

I can't comprehend how this committee came to the conclusion that it was acceptable to merge two already geographically enormous rural constituencies, whilst donating their two largest employers (Bangor University and Ysbyty Gwynedd) to a neighbouring constituency.

BCW-8950/ / Cardiff

I was alarmed to learn of the proposal to reduce the number of Welsh parliamentary constituencies to 32. We need more MPs and Senedd members and not fewer. If there are only 32 MPs, people will feel even more remote from their MPs than many of them feel they are now. And I will sympathise with any MP who complains that a larger constituency will place an unacceptable burden of work upon him (or her).

It is not as though there will be multi-member constituencies elected by proportional representation. We will still have the old, undemocratic, first-past-the-post system with one MP per constituency.

In Sweden, with a population of about 10,400,000, there are 349 Riksdag members, i.e. one member for about every 29,800 citizens. In Finland, with a population of about 5,500,000, there are 200 Eduskunta members, i.e. one member for about every 27,500 citizens. In Denmark, with a population of about 5,800,000, there are 179 Folketing members, i.e. one member for about every 32,400 citizens. I could go on. In the House of Commons, there is one member for about every 102,000 citizens. Under your proposals, there will be one MP for about every 98,000 Welsh citizens. (In Germany, with a population of about 83,000,000, there are 709 Bundestag members, i.e. one member for about every 117,000 citizens. But in Germany there is strong regional government, which is represented nationally in the Bundesrat.) Admittedly I have counted all citizens in these figures, including children and others who are not electors. And electoral systems differ from country to country, with different voting systems, multi-member constituencies etc. And none of the foreign countries I have mentioned are burdened with an equivalent of an unelected House of Lords, which is numerically far larger than the House of Commons. But I see your hands are tied because you are unable to propose that constituencies have fewer that 69,724 electors. So my comments are probably a waste of time anyway.

As far as my own constituency, Cardiff West, is concerned, I fail to see how Pont-y-Clun can be considered to be a part of Cardiff West.

Your proposals are all of a piece with the Conservatives' attempt (producing ID cards at polling stations, weakening of the Electoral Commission, first-past-the-post to elect mayors and police commissioners, restrictions on the right to protest etc.) at a power-grab. They will make Wales and the United Kingdom less and not more democratic. Your website says the number of constituencies 'must' be reduced to 32. There is no 'must' about it at all. It is not some law of physics. It is hypocritical and undemocratic to invite comments on something which is going to happen anyway.

I have copied the text of this letter to my MP, Mr Kevin Brennan.

BCW-8951/ / Penarth

The proposed new constituency of Cardiff South and Penarth contains far too much of the population centres of the Vale of Glamorgan.

Namely, Penarth, Dinas Powys and Sully.

The Vale of Glamorgan is a separate Council area to Cardiff and does not even share post codes or dialing codes.

Penarth, Dinas Powys and Sully has nothing in common with the southern areas of Cardiff other than a coastline.

The shape of the proposed new constituency is convoluted in the extreme, the eastern boundary is nearly in Newport.

I live in the Vale of Glamorgan and I am proud of that fact, I want a Vale of Glamorgan MP not a Cardiff MP.



This boundary line is impractical and will split neighbouring streets into those who can access Bridgend only services and those who can't by yards. Bryntirion is geographically within Bridgend and it make no sense to designate it otherwise.

BCW-8957 / Caernarfon

I'm all for reducing the number of MPs (and paying them more, incidentally) but I am very uncomfortable about the proposed boundary changes for a variety of reasons:

- 1) Impacts significantly on devolved nations of UK, reducing their representation in HoC. Wales is very materially hit.
- 2) The proposal is driven by the fundamentally flawed concept that, to be more democratically fair, constituencies should broadly have the same size of Electorate. In fact, this distorts democracy & risks damaging it as it artificially crams into single constituencies a wide range of socio-economic demographics with wildly disparate sets of priorities. The most obvious example is that the 'rural voice' will be diluted, whereas urban voices will be made louder.
- 3) It would have been better to base constituencies on 'communities of interest', so that their representative in HoC could be a strong, clear voice for the distinct & specifc issues common across their 'patch'. In such a scenario, it is possible that cities might have less MPs, as the issues are more likely to be consistent / common in type, if not at a detailed level.
- 4) The interplay between central & local government (who owns what activities, who funds etc) is something that needs sorting, I would argue, more urgently than boundary changes. Under the local government umbrella across the UK, there is a plethora of bodies & I wonder how much duplication / treading on toes happens.
- 5) I think more thought needs to be put into what MPs are actually there to do and what we, as the Electorate, have a right to expect from them. There isn't a set Job Description, a set requirement to perform to a certain level &, with FPTP & candidate selection processes, there is little point in arguing that the Electorate can 'vote with its feet', come election time.
- 6) Personally, I would have preferred the focus to be on reform of the House of Lords & our archaic electoral systembut that is a discussion for another day & another Government.

BCW-8958 / Pencoed

It is only the dual carriageway that separates where I live to the Vale of Glamorgan. My property is almost situated in the river Ewenny that is how close I am. I think I would be far better off coming under Vale if Glamorgan Council than continuing to come under Bridgend.

BCW-8959 / Aberystwyth

It is clear to see that the proposals seek to combine Preseli - a traditionally conservative seat with Ceredigion - a Plaid Cymru strong hold.

It is clear from looking at the most recent election results that voters in Ceredigion would be significantly outnumbered by those in Preseli resulting in a loss of a Plaid Cymru seat. Not only does that seem to be a cynical, political tactic but it will also mean that a constituency that goes back to before 1600 (with a brief hiatus) will not be properly represented.

Combining this consitutency has been attempted before in the 1983, only to be restored in 1997. It obviously didn't work then - it's not going to work now.

Ceredigion has a low population density, but that doesn't mean that we don't count. We are a unique county - with 2 seats of higher education and a distinguished library, and a far higher than average graduate population. We are also in the heart of Wales which is reflected in the vibrant culture and commitment to the Welsh language.

We need to be represented and we have chosen to be represented by Ben Lake - who puts our needs (which are different from those in suburban and urban areas, and those of the English) first. He speaks for us - as an MP is supposed to.

To collapse our constituency and combine it with Preseli would effectively disenfranchise the voters of Ceredigion and take our situtation back to the days before parliamentary reform.

BCW-8960 / A Bangor

I feel it being absolutely ridiculous for the City of Bangor to be split into two constituencies with two different MP's. At a time Bangor is attempting to re- grow after a shut down due to the Corvid situation, we do NOT need it splitting up in any way. This is just another knock to Bangor by the biased political group in Caernarfon diluting our city once again. Please DO NOT ALLOW /ACCEPT this proposal.

BCW-8961 / Bridgend

I do not agree with Broadlands and Laleston being moved into the Aberavon constituency instead of Bridgend.

This seems a ludicrous idea as residents of Broadlands' addresses actually include the word "Bridgend" and should therefore remain in Bridgend.

Half of the Broadlands estate would be in Bridgend and the other half in Aberavon. How ridiculous!



I moved from Ynys Mon to Bangor two years ago and have had nothing but praise for my MP. I thus avoided being represented by an MP without links to the area on YM who only echoes the government in Westminster.

Because of the very different demographics, joining Bangor to Conwy, Llandudno and Betwys-y-C risks changing the political hue toward the Tories in such a way that Bangor's interests will no longer be represented. I also fear that the decision has been made without taking Bangor's particular situation into account, in that the number of registered voters does not represent the number of residents, which includes a large number of students who may not register locally, or do so late in the day.

It is difficult to accept that this decision has been made without political bias in order to consolidate a Westminster Tory power grab, and this in addition to an Electoral Bill which will disenfranchise many poorer voters. These are more likely to be found in Bangor and Arfon than in the Conwy and Llandudno areas.

BCW-8964 / Bangor

I would like to object to the proposed changes to the electoral boundaries of Arfon. Abolishing this constituency is completely unacceptable, as is splits the most Welsh city in Wales in two, with Penrhosgarnedd joining Caernarfon, and the rest of the city becoming a part of Aberconwy.

Bangor has much more in common in terms of culture, population and use of the Welsh language, than with the coastal areas in Aberconwy e.g., Llandudno, and I believe that Bangor will be forgotten in a constituency that already deals with a wide range of areas, from rural Llanrwst to Llandudno, with its older and more English population.

I do not believe that it makes any sense at all to split a city as small as Bangor in half – this will create glaring difficulties in terms of addressing the city's problems, including the development of the Welsh language, urban regeneration, planning issues and commercial developments.

The proposed change will mean that one of the city's schools will be in a different constituency to the others – there is no way that Ysgol y Faenor, Bangor has more in common with schools in Tywyn, Meirionnydd, 75 miles away, than with Ysgol y Garnedd, which is less than half a mile down the road but in a different constituency.

Also, how on earth is one Member of Parliament expected to give fair attention and representation to residents in Bangor and Aberdovey, which are 75 miles and more than a two-hour journey away from each other? This is also the case for the proposed Ceredigion Preseli constituency – 80 miles from one end of the constituency to the other, and that, as in Gwynedd, along unwieldy, rural roads.

I believe that Wales' rural communities deserve more consideration than they are being given through this proposed new system, and that changes based on population numbers should be disregarded. Communities and landscape should be taken into consideration, rather than elector numbers, when considering this change.

None of this will make any difference to the political map of Wales although I do agree that the number of MPs should be reduced dramatically in the UK. 400 would be more than enough.

My second point is that Devolution, combined with Brexit, have ruined the UK by introducing an increasing number of layers of (useless purpose) government. Local authorities, old-style, performed a perfectly acceptable way to run the UK.

BCW-8967 / Aberystwyth

The proposal to merge Ceredigion and the northern portion of Pembrokeshire does not cohere to your stated aim of deference to local ties.

Due to the geography of Ceredigion, through the centralisation of healthcare, education, and commerce in Aberystwyth, the town acts as a hub for a very wide catchment area. I had many a classmate from as far as Tywyn in the North, and Cardigan in the South.

Northern Pembrokeshire does not, however, fall into this catchment area. Cardies, I feel, are kindred far more with Machynlleth and the Dyfi estuary than with Northern Pembrokeshire. Culturally, Pembrokeshire is a very different place, possessing a like departure from Ceredigion in their political culture. I have no animus toward the people of Pembrokeshire; I merely feel that it is mutually detrimental for us to share a comically over-extended parliamentary constituency, in which it would be impossible to campaign for any party, and which extends so far beyond the reasonable geographic extent within which one can feel represented.

I understand that the commission's hands are tied because of the stipulations laid out in law. However, in order to make up the necessary electorate population, my solemn suggestion is that Ceredigion - if its boundaries must be changed - have the settlements of Machynlleth, Aberdyfi, and Tywyn merged with it. This is for the aforementioned reasons.

BCW-8968 / / Altrincham

The proposed constituency of Llanelli includes the wards of Llangunnor, Llangundeyrn and St.Ishmael which are currently in Carmarthen East and Dinefwr. These wards, especially Llangunnor, are much more closely linked to the town of Carmarthen than the town of Llanelli. I therefore propose that they are included in the proposed constituency of Carmarthen. To compensate, I propose that the wards of Penygroes and Saron are included in Llanelli, rather than Carmarthen.

I live in Bangor and feel that as Bangor is a cosmopolitan, university city it would be more appropriate for the proposed change to go ahead so that Bangor is aligned with Conwy and Llandudno. Arfon is too small to stand as its own constituency. Caernarfon and Bangor have little in common and so can easily be split apart. Caernarfon relies on the tourist industry. Bangor is a leading, academic city with links to the rest of the UK and the world and is located on the A55 with excellent links to North-Fast Wales.

BCW-8971 / / Altrincham

I propose that the ward of Sketty is included in the proposed Swansea Central and North constituency, rather than Swansea West and Gower. This provides a natural border between the two constituencies along the Clyne River and through woodland. To compensate, I propose that the four northern wards of Llangyfelach, Mawr, Penllergaer and Pontardulais are included in Swansea West and Gower. Consequently, Swansea Central and North can be renamed Swansea Central. This configuration results in less disruption to the current electorate and improves the make-up of the two constituencies.

BCW-8972 / Altrincham

Further to the transfer of the wards of Llanrumney and Rumney to Cardiff Central, the ward of Trowbridge is effectively detached from the rest of the proposed constituency of Cardiff South and Penarth, as the boundary with the neighbouring ward of Splott is along the foreshore. Without making substantial changes to the rest of the Cardiff constituencies, the only solution to this is to include Trowbridge in Cardiff Central and move the ward of Cathays to Cardiff South and Penarth. This entails changing the names of the two constituencies to Cardiff East, and Cardiff Central and Penarth, respectively.

BCW-8973 / Bridgend

I am of the view that Broadlands and Laleston should be included in the Bridgend boundary as the services, school etc are all part of the bridgend constituency and an MP covering this area will be more interested in delivering a good service to the people of Bridgend. Aberafan is not a natural connector with Broadlands

BCW-8974 / Bridgend

This is absolutely ridiculous and should not be set and the proposed boundaries. Broadlands is less than a mile from Bridgend town centre when some towns within Bridgend borough are up to 9 miles from the town centre! Do not let this happen.

BCW-8975 / Llanelli

The proposed new consistuency area includes areas over 20 miles away from Llanelli, including areas that could not reasonably think of themselves as being Llanelli, therefore the constituency name is no longer appropriate. A more appropriate name would be South Carmarthenshire as the area is fully within the county of Carmarthenshire, and covers the southern part of the county.

BCW-8976 / Llanelli

The proposed area has been allocated the constituency name of "Caerfyrddin" however the constituency includes areas 35 miles away from Carmarthen, whilst excluding areas routinely considered as Carmarthen including the town's railway station, and everything south and east of it. As a result, it seems strange to call it "Caerfyrddin".

North East and West Carmarthenshire would be more appropriate.

If you want to keep it Welsh to further the remit of the Welsh Nationalists, then you may wish to consider Sir Gâr, which is used to describe the area by the council and colleges.



BCW-8977 / Penarth

Penarth is part of the Vale of Glamorgan. It's residents and their views are more closely aligned with other people in that county rather than Cardiff.

An MP elected for the Vale is more likely to represent my views in the UK parliament more effectively than an MP for Cardiff South.

An MP elected for the Vale would be faced different pressures and issues than those found in Cardiff South.

The net effect is to dilute the vote of all people living in this part of the Vale with those of Cardiff South and disenfranchise them from the political I also process.



The proposals place the ward of Llangunnor (2,077 Parliamentary electors) into the Llanelli constituency, and not into the Carmarthen constituency.

Llangunnor is described online as "a southern suburb of Carmarthen town" and includes Carmarthen's only railway station, as well as a large number of the town's retail commercial and industrial buildings, and more importantly, over 2,000 electors who see themselves as part of Carmarthen, and not Llanelli.

The current proposals sees Carmarthen segregated into two constituencies, one using the name of the town even though not including the whole town! I propose that Llangunnor is moved from the Llanelli constituency to the Carmarthen consistuency. By doing this, the number of electors in the Llanelli constituency will reduce by 2,077 to 69,895 and the number of electors in the Carmarthen constituency will increase by 2,077 to 72,683. Both these revised numbers meet the requirement to have no less than 69,724 Parliamentary electors and no more than 77,062 Parliamentary electors.



By including Overton, Penley and surrounding area in a large Wrexham ward I feel you are eroding our rural identity.

BCW-8980 / Cardiff

The consultation map names the constituency "Ynys Mon", without the circumflex above the 'o'. It should be ensured that the name of the constituency is spelled correctly – "Ynys Môn".



Splitting Rhos on Sea from Colwyn Bay makes no sense. Issues in both areas will be similar and will now require the attention of x2 MPs (not that they'd be interested). Also, why is Bangor included in Aberconwy? It is bizarre. And why does Anglesey have special status? Its a barren wasteland. Amalgamate it with the current Arfon constituency.



The boundaries in northwest Wales look like a case of gerrymandering!

There is little social/cultural connection between the industrial towns in northwest Gwynedd (Blaenau Ffestiniog, Porthmadog, Pwllheli, Bangor, Caernarfon, Bethesda) and the rural, agricultural towns in south Meirionnydd (Bala, Dolgellau).

Similarly, the agricultural towns in the south of the former county of Clwyd (Ruthin, Denbigh, Corwen, Llangollen, Llanrwst) are very similar socially, but are divided between a variety of seats that are dominated by large coastal towns.

Suggestion: move Bethesda and Bangor to a north Gwynedd seat. Move south Meirionnydd to a rural, agricultural seat which includes Ruthin, Denbigh, Corwen, Llangollen, Llanrwst, and create more coastal seats – Llandudno, Conwy and Colwyn Bay, Rhyl and Prestatyn, Flint, Connah's Quay and Holywell.

This would be a much better reflection of social and cultural patterns.



Not at all happy with being shipped off to Merthyr borough council, I am nearly 62 with health issues, my local council offices at present is literally down the road from me, so big changes like this makes me so anxious, as I suffer with anxiety and chronic depression as it is, as I am waiting to be rehoused in more suitable accommodation under carrphilly borough to be closer to my family who also reside in the caerphilly borough, three years I've waited and worried what will now happen, hearing this as made my anxiety go through the roof today.

NOT HAPPY ABOUT THIS AT ALL, leave nelson under caarphilly Borough.

BCW-8984 / Pontypridd

Hello, just thought I'd share a comment about naming constituencies. I think that there could be an issue where the same name is used for a UK parliamentary constituency as is used for a Senedd constituency or local authority *if* the footprint is different.

For example, if Torfaen exists with exactly the same boundaries as a local authority and UK constituency there ought not be a problem.

But, in Pontypridd, you could have a Senedd Pontypridd constituency and a UK constituency with different footprints but the same name. This obvs could cause confusion for the public.

Other than keeping separate names for constituencies, you could look at a prefix (UK - Pontypridd) or maybe, and bear with me, how about using a numbering system like the US House (Wales - 30, Wales - 22),. That's a very neutral and precise solution.



I have recently bought my first house in Nelson BECAUSE it's outside of the Merthyr borough so would be very unhappy if my postcode came under the Merthyr borough. I have lived in Merthyr all my life and have found the council services to be disorganised and unhelpful, plus my council tax would go up considerably if this change was to occur. The Caerphilly constituency has been brilliant since moving. We have no issues with bin collection or contacting the council for any other reason and the council seems to be more proactive, unlike Merthyr Council.



This proposal is absolutely ludicrous. If this boundary change was to go ahead my son's school would be in a different constituency to our home despite it being his local primary school. So our MP wouldn't represent the same constituency as the local education provider. My doctors surgery would be in a different constituency. Our local leisure centre - in fact the leisure centre for all of Bridgend would be in Aberavon. In what world does it make sense that the Ogmore Valleys (20 minutes away from Bridgend town centre) would be joined to Bridgend town but Broadlands (five minutes) wouldn't be. My parents live on Broadlands and 100% see themselves as Bridgend residents with no connection to Porthcawl and even less to Aberavon. They shop in Bridgend and conduct their day to day lives in Bridgend. They have no connection to issues impacting Neath / Port Talbot / Aberavon. The MP for Bridgend needs to represent everyone that pays council tax in Bridgend.

BCW-8987 / Bangor

Absolutely ridiculous to move us under aberconwy. Our identity, culture and language is nothing like Aber Conway constituency. Never mind things like schools - surely the boundary should be the line between Gwynedd and Conwy

BCW-8988 / Pridgend

Broadlands is very much part of Bridgend and the Bridgend community, as is Porthcawl. Throwing us in with Aberafan will do nothing to help ensure representation of the constituents. They are two very different communities with very different needs (and as a result would both vote in very different candidates to represent them). One or more communities within this newly proposed constituency would always be unhappy with the choice of representation. Don't split Bridgend up!



In the proposals, I would become part of the Porthcawl and Aberafan constituency. My address is literally 1 mile from the centre of Bridgend town centre, but over 5 miles from Porthcawl (further from Aberafan). Cefn Glas (my area) has nothing in common with Porthcawl or Aberafan. How will an MP understand our needs, or know anything about us? We are in the heart of Bridgend, not Aberafan etc. The community of Bridgend risks being torn apart here, with no voice to represent us.

The proposed constituency of Montgomeryshire and Glyndwr is flawed as there are no direct transport links between the part in Powys (the existing constituency of Montgomeryshire) and the part in Wrexham council (part of the existing constituency of Clwyd South). To correct this, I propose that Montgomeryshire is combined with Meirionnydd (part of the existing constituency of Dwyfor Meirionnydd) and "Glyndwr" is added to the Wrexham constituency. This results in significant changes to the other proposed constituencies in North Wales.

Replacing the Commission's proposed constituencies of Aberconwy, Alyn and Deeside, Clwyd, Delyn, Dwyfor Meirionnydd, Montgomeryshire and Glyndwr, and Wrexham, I propose the following:

1. Aberconwy - comprising the whole of the County Borough of Conwy, excluding the wards of Bryn, Capelulo, Pandy and Pant-yr-afon/Penmaenan in the north west of the borough, and the wards of Kinmel Bay, Llansannan and Towyn in the east of the borough.

The expanded constituency remains wholly within the County Borough of Conwy.

- 2. Alyn comprising:
- (i) the following County of Flintshire wards currently in the constituency of Alyn and Deeside: Broughton (2 wards), Buckley (4 wards), Pentrobin, Caergwrle, Higher Kinnerton, Hope, Llanfynydd, Penyffordd and Treuddyn;
- (ii) the following County of Flintshire wards currently in the constituency of Delyn: Argoed, Gwernaffield, Gwernymynydd, Leeswood, Mold (4 wards) and New Brighton;
- (iii) the following County Borough of Wrexham wards currently in the constituency of Wrexham: Gwersyllt (3 wards), Llay and Rossett; and
- (iv) the following County Borough of Wrexham wards currently in the constituency of Clwyd South: Brymbo, Bryn Cefn, Coedpoeth, Gwenfro, Minera and New Broughton.

This constituency incorporates a much greater length of the River Alyn than the existing and proposed constituencies of Alyn and Deeside.

3. Delyn and Deeside - comprising those wards in the County of Flintshire not included in the proposed constituency of Alyn.

This brings the whole of "Deeside" within one constituency.

- 4. Dwyfor Arfon comprising:
- (i) the following County of Gwynedd wards currently in the constituency of Dwyfor Meirionnydd: Aberdaron, Abererch, Abersoch, Botwnnog, Clynnog, Criccieth, Dolbenmaen, Efail-newydd/Buan, Llanaelhaearn, Llanbedrog, Llanengan, Llanystumdwy, Morfa Nefyn, Nefyn, Penrhyndeudraeth, Porthmadog (3 wards), Pwllheli (2 wards) and Tudweiliog;
- (ii) those County of Gwynedd wards comprising the whole of the current constituency of Arfon; and
- (iii) the County Borough of Conwy wards of Bryn, Capelulo, Pandy and Pant-yrafon/Penmaenan.

This newly configured constituency primarily comprises the areas covered by the former local authority districts of Dwfor and Arfon.

- 5. Montgomeryshire and Meirionnydd comprising:
- (i) those County of Powys wards comprising the whole of the current constituency of Montgomeryshire; and
- (ii) the County of Gwynedd wards not included in the proposed constituency of Dwyfor, Arfon and Conwy.

This combines the historic counties of Montgomeryshire and Merionethshire, with good road links between the two constituent parts.

- 6. Vale of Clwyd comprising:
- (i) the whole of the County of Denbighshire, excluding the wards of Corwen, Llandrillo and Llangollen; and
- (ii) the County Borough of Conwy wards of Kinmel Bay, Llansannan and Towyn.

This is an extension of the existing Vale of Clwyd constituency.

- 7. Wrexham and Glyndwr comprising:
- (i) those County Borough of Wrexham wards not included in the proposed constituency of Alyn; and
- (ii) the County of Denbighshire wards of Corwen, Llandrillo and Llangollen.

This links the town of Wrexham with the area of "Glyndwr", which the Commission proposes is included with Montgomeryshire. My proposal provides much better transport links between the two major towns of Wrexham and Llangollen.

I believe that my proposals provide an improved configuration of constituencies in North Wales, compared to the Commission's proposals.

I attach a spreadsheet showing my proposals for constituencies in the North Wales, including wards and electorates.

It would make more sense if Maesteg was put into the Aberavon parliamentary constituency than Broadlands and Bryntirion - a mere walk away from town!

I support the change, and I live in Aberkenfig and am represented by the Ogmore constituency. This doesn't seem right, because we have nothing to do with that Valley, and everything to do with Bridgend.

However, I don't see the reason why Porthcawl would change to Porthcawl and Aberavon.

The proposal to bering Bethesda and Dyffryn Ogwen into an Aberconwy constituency beggars belief. These are two VERY different parts of North West Wales, with significantly different cultures.

Llansannan is situated in a Welsh-speaking area that is incredibly proud of its roots. This is the birthplace of Tudur Aled, one of the greatest poets of the 16th century, and William Salesbury, who translated the New Testament into Welsh, to name but two.

There are lifelong ties between Uwchaled (Llangwm), Bro Aled (Llansannan) and Bro Cernyw (Llangernyw). These are historical, agricultural, geographical, linguistic, and cultural ties. All three areas have been part of the social fabric since before the modern boundaries were drawn.

These three areas are the 'backbone' of the county of Conwy.

Unfortunately, your initial recommendations disrupt this historic tradition by placing Llansannan in the Clwyd constituency, and Uwchaled in the Aberconwy constituency.

It is completely reasonable for Llansannan to be in the same constituency as Llangernyw, as there are less than 4 miles between us.

The Welsh-speaking area of Bro Aled (Llansannan) has much more in common with areas in the new Aberconwy constituency, than with several areas to the north in the Clwyd constituency.

Adding the 1485 electors from Llansannan to the Aberconwy constituency would help to redress the elector average between Aberconwy and Clwyd.

I hope that you will give these comments the attention they deserve. Maintaining our traditions and heritage in rural Wales is a battle, and your recommendations, as they stand, could undermine an entity that has existed for centuries.


From reading the full details of the boundary review process I can see that the fundamental principle is to make each constituency between 69,724 and 77,062.


The proposed changes to merge Ogmore/Aberavon and Bridgend constituencies into 2, in my view do not take account of the fact that the ward of Bryntirion, Laleston and Merthyr Mawr contains 2 of Bridgend's largest suburbs as well which are located at the right hand side of the ward boundary, whilst the ward is of large size, the population is intrinsically linked with the Bridgend constituency being part of the town.

In my view the opportunity to move Caerau ward, to Aberafan Porthcawl, where is is geographically on the current Aberavon constituency border and serves population links with the it's neighbouring community on the north west side of the current constituency of Croes Erw and surround villages including Blaengwnfi.

By switching Caerau (7,709) and Bryntirion, Laleston and Merthyr Mawr (9,334) both Bridgend and Aberafan/Porthcawl would become closer to the median number.

The following attachments show why Caerau would be better served. I would also suggest the boundary commission look at the physical maps of the ward rather than the boundary of Bryntirion, Laleston and Merthyr Mawr to better understand the illogical choice of removing this ward from Bridgend constituency.



I was wondering if it is possible to make up the electors by pushing up to the north or eastwards into Breacon and Radnor or/and Montgomeryshire and Gwlyndwr However I am happy with the naming.

Including the eastern Swansea area in the Neath constituency will present a marked change in the character of the constituency.

The Member of Parliament will be faced with a significant additional caseload from diverse new additions such as the Swansea university waterfront campus, & areas like Port Tennant & Bon y Maen which will require a lot of attention, inevitably taking away from the focus that the MP can give to the core Neath community that has traditionally been the heart of his or her work. As a Neath valley constituent I have little day to day interaction with Swansea East, but far more with the western fringes of Port Talbot & the Afan Valley. Even the school catchments tend to be between Neath & Afan rather than Neath & Tawe valleys. If boundary is to change, I'd prefer to see a Neath/Afan alignment to a Neath/Tawe one.

If Caldicot were to become part of the new Monmouthshire constituency then I would feel remote from it. I appreciate Monmouthshire is a convenient boundary to use but those of us in the south have little/no connection with the major part of it.

I fail to see how Rumney which is 4 miles east of the centre of Cardiff can be considered to be part of Cardiff central. It has only the ward of Trowbridge to the east of it and nothing to the south of it so fits correctly as part of Cardiff South and Pennarth. Formally it was not even in Cardiff and the River Rhymney forms a sensible divide between Cardiff Central and Cardiff South.

I welcome these changes, as our area in northern Pembrokeshire is closer to Ceredigion culturally and linguistically. BUT... I am concerned about the Maenclochog ward, as it has been lumped in with the south of the county, which is far from being close linguistically/culturally. Perhaps it would be better to include Maenclochog in the Ceredigion Preseli constituency and include a ward from the St David's area in the south. If the boundary stays like this, there is the potential to create huge community divisions.

BCW-9042/ / St Asaph

I find your proposals for north Wales a lot more sensible than those of the last boundary commission a few years ago. There is a respect for which communities have a similar outlook, and contacting rural communities to larger towns rather than creating vast rural areas.

BCW-9043/ Mountain Ash

Mountain ash and Pontypridd are not the same, they are two completely areas with different areas. Cynon valleys and Merthyr should join

The new constituency areas will not conform with local council constituency areas.

This is likely to cause confusion for many residents in the new areas and disrupt the local services that some Members of Parliament provide for them.

BCW-9045/ / Bangor

There was some development in Penrhosgarnedd in the 1970s, but Bangor has expanded into the area since the building of the hospital and the by-pass in the 80s. From polling data I estimate that there are now between 1,500 and 1,700 people living in the Penrhosgarnedd area between the Bangor boundary and the by-pass. That is more than 10% of the electorate of Bangor, and it would seem logical to include this area within the city and the constituency. Something that the imminent changes to the county ward boundaries has failed to recognise. This would add up to 1,700 electors to the Aberconwy constituency, which is very close to the minimum number permitted and 2,053 smaller than the Dwyfor Meirionydd constituency. Dwyfor Meirionydd would then be just over 70,000 electorate, but a much larger area.

The by-pass would also make a more obvious boundary than the current poorly defined boundary.



The ward is called llanneli, yet covers parts of Carmarthen! Which means that Carmarthen itself is split into 2 mps! Surely the Carmarthen mp should look after Carmarthen. Perhaps include Llandeilo instead of the Carmarthen wards? This would be geographically better, and the road links between are direct.

I have lived in Bangor for 6 years and feel a strong connection with Arfon and the rest of Gwynedd. So putting Bangor city centre in the same constituency as Llandudno, Llanrwst and Betws-y-Coed makes no sense because the demographics are completely different and traditionally they are politically different. This suggestion would make the constituency extremely difficult to be represented by a single party.

Also I do not feel that creating a divide within the city and community of Bangor is helpful for 'cohesion' throughout the community, since clear divisions already exist in the community and dividing these wards between 2 different constituencies would only highlight these divisions.

It also makes a lot more sense to create a new constituency in one local authority rather than create a constituency that includes 95% of the county and placing the other 5% in a constituency in a different county.

I therefore suggest that Gwynedd remains a single complete constituency that includes the communities of Bangor and Bethesda. And that the Aberconwy constituency begins at the border between the local authorities of Gwynedd and Conwy

If they do not do this and are therefor likely to give favour to or are perceived to give an advantage to any one party, then the changes, though not illegal, demonstrate a totally undemocratic or fair system. If that is the case then the boundary commission for Wales is clearly just a puppet of the Westminster government and should be investigated fully and it's members be banned from any public office until such matters have been resolved. If that is not the case then I hope that the historic and projected voting demographics can be published for all to see before any changes are considered further. I don't understand how Pontyclun can be joined with St Fagans and Ely, as Cardiff West. We are under a separate local authority and, therefore, have separate council tax bands and rightly so. All the other areas under this proposition are within the Cardiff local authority and so their rates are higher because of this. If rates are calculated based on these new areas, then I'm angry that we in Pontyclun/Miskin will end up with the same rates but none of the same benefits. Reason being, local authorities manage their own budgets and what they offer to residents.

Also, I used to live in the Cardiff West area, I. E. Ely, before moving out to Miskin. I moved because I wanted to get away from the area and its associations, but now I'm being forced under this new proposition to go back. This is an outrage!



I approve of the re-allocation of the pontyclun and Miskin area from Pontypridd to Cardiff West. I feel this better represents the local ties the community has. Although this means the constituency is misaligned with the local authority boundaries. The area of Miskin and pontyclun I feel is in a position that is lost on isolated periphery of RCT and as such many residents feel that is should be moved to the Cardiff or Vale of Glamorgan local authority area in any case as better represent their ties and local activity.

My local GP surgery is Llanharan. They also have a sister surgery in Pencoed medical centre.

If this proposal goes ahead what happens to the surgeries. As Pencoed sister surgery does things that are not available on Llanharan due to specialist medical services and also due to Covid your went to a specific surgery atm.

I am disabled and chronically ill. I am at the doctors at least twice a month and on the phone to them weekly. Its going to put extra pressure on hospitals and A&E and AMBU if this proposal goes ahead. There at breaking point as it is.

I had to travel to Prince Charles hospital merthyr as out of hours emergency this week as specialist service not available at RGH llantrisaint. They are at breaking point too. Waiting times are up to 10 hours for emergancy. And local surgery isn't equipped for influx on capacity.

As a resident in Llanharry, I don't feel the interests of Rhondda, the constituency we'd be moved to, are shared by us in the same was as those in The Vale, or Cardiff West, or Pontypridd. We are on the border of the four constituencies and, as a village directly on the M4, we would have different priorities and issues to those in the Rhondda itself. Perhaps, for example, where we are likely to look to our MP for support with over development, traffic, and are able to easily access hospitals in Cardiff and Bridgend, those living even a little further North are likely to have more concern over lack of access to Cardiff and the facilities we already have along with greater concern regarding under development. Any MP would, I believe, find our issues more closely aligned to those across their area if we shifted into a different neighbouring constituency.

I feel that the creation of the proposed new Mid and South Pembrokeshire constituency makes sense. Removing Carmarthen West would be a good move. It would allow the MP to focus on a more compact area and perhaps be more effective all round.

I am a native of Bethesda, I work in Carrnarfon, I do most of my shopping in Bangor (where I was born), all in the current Arfon constituency. Though I feel a connection with the Welsh speaking rural areas to the south and east (in the Conwy and Lledr valleys, which my community would join in the new constituency of Aberconwy) I feel much more connected to the former slate mining areas to the West (they are my prople, I'm from Arfon not Aberconwy).

I have no real affinity with the coastal conurbation to the north-east of the new constituency, namely Llandudno, Llandudno Junction etc. These places, though not foreign to me, make me feel foreign when visiting them. There, I struggle to hear and speak my native language on the streets and in the shops. The conversations I hear there are not concerned with my experiences and the issues that affect me. I feel the purpose of these places is not for my benefit, but for the benefit of English tourists, retirees and those who serve them. Yet, the concentration of population in the northeast corner of "Aberconwy" will ensure that it is the views of THESE people and the issues affecting THIS area that will dominate the outcome of elections.

The issues I point out here also easily apply to people throughout the rural hinterland of the North Wales coastal strip. The way the constituencies are marked out with a populous Anglo-centric north dominating a more sparsely populated rural Welsh speaking south, is frankly a missed opportunity to better enfranchise and represent the different communities hereabouts.

A fairer and more imaginative reorganisation could easily have been devised if the axis of the communities was west to east (horizontal) rather than north to south (vertical). Thus, the communities of the coastal strip from Llandudno through to Prestatyn, having much in common, would be fairly represented. Also the rural interior respectively, with its market towns like Conwy, Llanrwst, Rhuddlan, Denbigh, Ruthin, Corwen etc, and their associated surrounding villages and farming communities would be enfranchised in a way that more accurately reflects their nature.

The way these proposed boundary changes have been drawn is in my opinion lazy and unimaginative, and serves only to criminally perpetuate the disenfranchisement of a vast tract of rural north Wales for the benefit of an element that seeks to marginalise it, and to minimise the cultural distinctiveness of its people.

Please, for the good of democracy, reconsider.

Constituency events in the proposed new Constituency would be difficult to attend since a car journey of 2.5 hours would be required one way to attend an event in the northernmost part of the Constituency. In Neath, all constituency events can be accessed by a maximum of 1/2 hour travel. Younger votes are encouraged to participate in these events yet travelling greater distances to events would put younger people off. Many young voters do not possess cars or cannot afford the fuel to run them for long distances .

River Boundaries

The boundaries, it is claimed have been influenced by rivers. The river Tawe, flows through Pontardawe, and the Alltwen ward is on the east (Neath) side of the river. I have lived in my house since 1981. I have been part of the community even longer. Throughout this time, Brynsadler has been on the margins. Sometimes I am in one place and sometimes somewhere else but I haven't moved. The proposed boundary changes would mean I am in Rhondda-Cynon-Taff unitary authority, in the Senedd constituency of Pontypridd, and under the proposal I would be on the fringes of Cardiff West.

This proposal ensures my area will be on the margins. Cardiff West expands to Ely and elsewhere, which have their own issues and with more people it seems likely my area wouldn't get the voice like others as we are split in different directions. We have a close connection to Talbot Green and Llantrisant, more than Ely. I understand the need for change but not at all costs. My area of Brynsadler and Pontyclun can remain together within the new limits under the Pontypridd constituency. It would mean we're represented at the Senedd and Westminster in the same area. More boundaries means it is difficult to know who is doing what for who for my area. It makes more sense, and within the brief, for this to happen on a tangible basis.

Now, I have little to no affinity to Cardiff West. I do go to town for shopping occasionally but that's about it. I doubt the Cardiff West MP would care about my area as we're right on the edge and have little in common with the rest of Cardiff West. Cardiff is not where we are. Pontypridd may not be on my doorstep but it has similar issues as is much closer. It would make more sense to remain in the Pontypridd constituency.

I am concerned that it makes voting too complicated and thus will mean fewer people voting which is a problem. People's voices need to be heard and this seems likely to make this less achievable.

I would urge a rethink because it makes sense to me and if you talk to others in the community it will likely wield a similar reply that Pontyclun and Brynsadler remain in the Pontypridd constituency and not be part of some experiment for people far away. Our votes matter and this proposal erodes our voice.

It seems impractical that Miskin will be part of Cardiff West. We are part of Pontyclun yet will be in a completely different constituency. How on earth will this work when we want to contact our MS about wider community issues. Do we have to complain to two? Or to an MS that is not our representative? Keep Talbot Green, Pontyclun, Miskin and Llantrisant as the same constituency. Separating them is impractical and confusing.



An absolute waste of time, money and resources; particularly whilst still in the biggest pandemic in modern history. I would like to object to the proposed new constituencies. You have somehow managed to break up the Rhymney Valley - an area stretching approximately 15 miles - in to four separate constituencies. That is staggering. Our valley has proudly had its own identity for many years. As with most of the south Wales valleys, both the geography (river Rhymney) and transport links (train line and A469) of the valley run north to south, not east and west. Yet these proposals stretch in to areas that are greatly outside our historical boundaries.

As with the Rhondda Fach and Rhondda Fawr, to give two examples, we are a valley in our own right. Islwyn is also a separate, stand-alone valley, Although neighbouring, it is a different area with different social and geographic characteristics. The extremes of your proposals are so out-of-touch with historical, cultural and social factors. well aware to us who have spent our lives living here, but evidently not to those undertaking this work. Ystrad Mynach and Nelson effectively abutt each other - via Parc Penallta - yet Ystrad Mynach is in the same constituency as Risca, with Nelson in the same constituency as Rhigos. I urge you to please look again at the proposals concerning the Rhymney Valley.

I can accept proposals that maybe split the valley into north and south (with Llandbradach as the cutoff) but cannot see any logic or local empathy with breaking the valley up in to four separate areas, none of which acknowledge the existence of the Rhymney Valley.

BCW-9144 / Bridgend

The annexing of Broadlands from Bridgend into Aberafan is ridiculous. It makes zero sense geographically when they is a very clear boundary at the end of the estate.

I live in Llantrisant and believe Llantrisant and Talbot green should remain in the same constituency as Pontyclun and Miskin.

They utilise the same retail parks, the same school up until recently, (which again I do not agree with) the same train station (Pontyclun) as it's within walking distance

Where as from beddau on, people use treforest train station, treforest retail park, and therefore from beddau on it makes sense to put under pontypridd, and keep Llantrisant and Talbot green with Pontyclun and Miskin.

Caerphilly is not an area often frequented by Newport commuters, shoppers or tradesmen or vice versa. Caerphilly is much more naturally connected to areas to the West, South and North of Caerphilly town, in the Rhymney valley, considering the roughly North/South axial alignment of the Welsh valleys An Eastward connection is very strange, historically unprecedented and artificially contived ignoring all sense of place, and local attachments.

There is on the other hand a good case for adding the wards containing Risca, Cross Keys, Cwmcarn and Abercarn, heading north as far as Newbridge to Newport West. The lower Sirhowy and Ebbw valleys, and their transport links naturally lead to Newport.



BCW-9199 / Newport

First and foremost I would like to say that this must be a difficult decision to make and my respect goes to those having to make it.

I believe it would make more sense for Sofrydd to sit under Islwyn to make it a clearer boundary line.

Currently there is an argument over the maintenance of an essential footpath between Sofrydd and Crumlin. It is disputed between Blaenau Gwent and Caerphilly who carries out work to the footpath. Due to ongoing arguments whereby each council says it's the others responsibility, and visa versa, the path remains to be in a sorry state and a risk to the public. This path is in desperate need of repair works.

Sofrydd technically comes under Crumlin, and Crumlin underneath the Caerphilly borough. Residents sometimes receive newsletters from the Caerphilly borough but we don't from Blaenau Gwent.

The technicality caused confusion last year with the Covid-19 local lockdowns when residents of Caerphilly initially was told to stay home. South Wales Argus listed the areas that fell under Caerphilly and reported that residents in Crumlin needed to stay home. Despite Sofrydd falling under Crumlin, we followed the guidance for the Blaenau Gwent borough.

I conclude it would make far more sense for Sofrydd to come under Islwyn.







If the aim of the exercise is proportional representation, then electoral reform is the way forward, not a self serving, English-first boundary change.





I personally find it ridiculous that the plans involve cutting the Cynon Valley in half - giving half to Pontypridd, and half to Merthyr. Ignoring that this now means the newly proposed Aberdare & Merthyr Constituency now straddles two unitary authorities. The earlier proposals from the 2018 review to abandon Pontypridd and split that between the Rhondda and Cynon was more straightforward, as it at least left us with constituencies that followed the borders of the county borough.

There are added problems with the newly revised Pontypridd constituency, in that it removes both Taffs Well & Pontyclun and merges them with Cardiff constituencies. This once more ignores the layout of the county borough, in the same way as with the Cynon.

My opinion is that a better solution is to simply split the Pontypridd Constituency, and give the Ely Valley portions over to the Rhondda & the Taff Valley portions over to the Cynon - thus reducing the number of MPs in RCT to two, while still respecting the borders of the county borough.

With ongoing increased costs of living and council tax bills it makes sense to also make other savings such as these




I am curious as to why Cardiff central is not bounded to the north by the A48 near Maindy - it would seem more natural to not have a change between near-neighbouring streets here.

North of Crai the land becomes high quality agricultural land and commons. The old Radnorshire is almost entirely agricultural with tough farming conditions.

The communities of Pontardawe area do not have many community ties with the proposed Brecon constituency. Rather the ties (from Ystradgynlais south) are with the wider Swansea and Swansea Valley areas and into the valleys east and west. I.e. NOT North.

The settlements in the South of the proposed constituency are distinct from the more dispersed rural settlements; with different socio-economic needs.

The population will be better served by being part of a constituency of the southern valley areas.

BCW-9254 / Denbigh

This change will have no effect on us in the Vale of Clwyd, or in the Conwy Valley areas. Once again, the map has been drawn so that politicians will favour the populous coastal areas with their incomers, rather than the native Welsh living in the more sparsely populated areas

Our voices are being drowned out under a massive coastal wave. I am aware that each constituency has to have a certain number of electors, but once again we have had a bad deal. Why on earth could you have not created constituencies which cut across rural areas, so that towns and areas with similar needs and problems are grouped together? While considering the combination of other boroughs has been taken it looks as though the merger Blaenau Gwent and Rhumney Valleys is combining some of the most economically and socially deprived areas and putting shoving them together. It's almost as if the Cream of the adjoining areas of both Rhumney and Blaenau Gwent have been hoovered up by larger more "successful" councils and what's left has been bundled together to be labelled as BG&R.

These areas have some of the highest unemployment, sickness and overall poverty. In BGCBC case especially some of the highest council tax rates nationally with the lowest services delivered (3 weekly refuse collections, no public toilets, council run gyms that are more expensive than premium city centre gyms........). The boundaries over all make very little sense geographically with regard to the Abertillery area especially as communities like Christchurch above Aberbeeg will be in a different council even though they will access doctors etc in Aberbeeg which is only 1/3 of a mile away. When the boundary considerations where made it would have made sense to have amalgamated BGCBC east into islwy and BGCBC West into a council west of it. It makes no sense in keeping a council that has historically failed and continues to fail it's residents and in fact bring in another economically challenged area to further strain the councils already strained finances. It is worth noting that BGCBC has no housing stock at all and works with housing associations, currently they have access to 1 emergency housing hostel that has 1 family room that is 2 bedroom so is suitable for 1 family with 1 child then it becomes overcrowded. This is

wholly inadequate and if the council expanded this would only be made worse by an increase in demand. I have personal experience of this system and the lack of support for disabled people with families who've became homeless and the council's eagerness to discharge they're obligations under section 73 of the housing act. Overall by combining the Blaenau Gwent and Rhumney Valleys you are creating an area that is a focus of social and economic deprive and lack of social mobility. They also lack good and affordable links to long term gainful employment. The other areas seem to assimilated other gainful and productive areas Blaenau Gwent and Rhumney seem to be the area that no other council's wanted so they set up on they're own at the cost of the residents.

BCW-9257 / Llanfairfechan

It doesn't feel like a natural split to split up Bangor between Gwynedd & Aberconwy. There is a more natural affinity between Aberconwy & Clwyd & Delyn for example. How people feel about an area matters too.

I also appreciate that you're not considering voting & how this will affect elections, but it is a concern for the public even if it is not a concern for this report. Some areas have a huge sense of identity based on which party they choose to represent them.

So my comments are about how people feel about their area & their sense of identity. Please make sure this is considered in your work. You could do an online survey to ask residents about their regional identity & how they feel about belonging to a certain town or constituency for example.

BCW-9258 / Llangynnwr

I totally oppose – the requirements of the people of Carmarthen town are totally unlike the requirements and needs of the people of Llanelli town. The two areas are completely different and they should definitely not be in the same constituency. The idea is ludicrous.

Completely against this ridiculous suggestion- the residents of these areas have entirely different needs and it is completely irresponsible to expect them to be served by a single constituency.

Reducing the numbers of constiuencies in Wales is a farce- it is an attack on Wales and its people.

The name of the constituency seems rather problematic to me. While Dwyfor and Meirionnydd are represented in the name, a (substantial!) part of the constituency is excluded from the name. In my opinion, the constituency could not be attached to the area further up, that of Arfon with the same name as the Abersoch/Aberdaron area.

I accept that 'Dwyfor, Arfon, Meirionnydd' is hardly a catchy name. But I know that it would be difficult for any political campaigner to convince voters in Rhiwlas or Penrhosgarnedd that they would be electing an MP for 'Dwyfor Meirionnydd!'

Introduction

The Association's area of interest is the historic county of Monmouth, but we are also proposing slight changes of name for other proposed constituencies suggested in the Commission's Initial Proposals.

We took part in the consultation for the 2013 proposals and are pleased to see that the 2023 proposals are much more suitable than either the 2013 or 2018 proposals.

Analysis of Commission's Initial Proposals

Monmouthshire

While we support the use of historic county names in the naming of constituencies, this needs to be done appropriately. The proposed 'Monmouthshire' constituency only covers 60% of the historic county, and would better be named 'East Monmouthshire'.

The proposed constituency is 95% the same as the existing 'Monmouth' constituency. The Commission's policy on the naming of constituencies is that, if constituencies remain largely unchanged, the existing constituency name should usually be retained. We therefore suggest that either 'East Monmouthshire' or the present 'Monmouth' would be more suitable.

Blaenau Gwent and Rhymney

This proposed constituency is significantly different from the existing 'Blaenau Gwent' constituency, comprising parts of four existing constituencies. We recommend that the historic constituency name of Ebbw Vale be revived for this proposal, either alone or as 'Ebbw Vale and Rhymney'.

Aberafan Porthcawl

This proposed constituency comprises the majority of Aberavon with the addition of Porthcawl from the existing Bridgend constituency. The logical name therefore is 'Aberavon and Porthcawl'.

Brecon and Radnor

This proposed constituency should retain the existing name 'Brecon and Radnorshire'. The entirety of Radnorshire is contained within the proposed constituency, just as it is in the present constituency. Therefore there is no compelling reason to remove it from the name.

Carmarthen

It is unclear from the Initial Proposals if this proposed constituency is to be titled 'Carmarthen', as shown in the electorate spreadsheet, or 'Caerfyrddin', as shown in the maps (with the 'alternative' name 'Carmarthen'). We recommend 'Carmarthen' for consistency with other English-language names.

Ceredigion Preseli

This proposed constituency would be better named as 'Cardiganshire and North Pembrokeshire', or 'Cardigan and North Pembrokeshire'. Previous reviews that have suggested adding northern Pembrokeshire to Cardiganshire (2013, 2018) have used the name 'North Pembrokeshire' rather than 'Preseli'. Given the geographical scope of this proposal, a less cumbersome name we would support is 'Cardigan Bay'.

BCW-9261/ Colwyn Bay

It is totally inappropriate for Bangor and surrounding areas to be added to the existing Aberconwy electorate. There is very little similarity between the areas or populations. I heard one so-called expert say that a major reason for the proposal was due to the cultural affinity between the populations. Obviously this expert has no knowledge or insight of the people of Aberconwy who are mainly English from a tourism/holiday area and Bangor which is a University City within a Welsh speaking agricultural area. The whole proposal is bonkers Aberconwy from the Conwy River eastwards should be alined with Denbighshire. Both already having strong cultural, political, business and community links.

BCW-9262/ / Gerlan

I do not agree with the proposed changes and do not feel they represent the culture, traditional political alliance, or voice of the people in my local area. As a result of the proposed changes our issues will be ignored and our voices will go unheard

BCW-9263/ / Bangor

I strongly oppose this change as it proposes to include areas of completely different historical and societal into one, which will no doubt be swallowed up by a Conservative majority. This area is largely Welsh speaking, with strong traditional industrial ties, and quite different to that of other areas located more towards the East.

To incorporate this area into Aberconwy would be a travesty.

BCW-9264/ / Bethesda

Local resident of Bethesda, fairly recently moved from another nearby town that will be under a different constituency.

Bethesda has a close historical tie to the Bangor and further slate communities going back hundreds of years.

Although admittedly close to Conwy and at the edge of Gwynedd I believe the line would be much better suited at the Aberfalls through to Ogwen.

BCW-9265/ Bethesda

I am extremely disappointed to learn that Bethesda will be part of the Aberconwy constituency.

The town of Bethesda differs tremendously culturally and socially to the majority of Aberconwy. I'm concerned that Bethesda will not have a fair voice within the constituency.

For an area that has voted Plaid Cymru for years it's highly likely we will be faced with a tory MP which will not be a fair representation for the area.

I truly hope the decision to change the electoral commission boundaries will be reconsidered.

I am at a loss as the logical reason for making this change. At a time when the economy is struggling they are considering making unnecessary changes which will cost a fortune, to me that is just totally irresponsible. Finances aside, it is hard to hide the fact that these changes will reduce the size of Welsh Representation in Westminster and increased English Representation. I can't think of a better reason to vote Independence for Wales.

BCW-9267/ / Bethesda

I'm not happy that my area, Bethesda, is being included with the anglicised areas of Aberconwy. Bethesda has nothing in common with these areas which are full of colonisers from over the border. Who will look after Welsh speakers in my area after this change? Hywel Williams has been an excellent MP who represents my area and its people well, who understands the constituency and understands its history and culture. 

I cannot seriously believe that people will feel that we are voting for a Newport MPtorepresent this the major town in the County Borough that is the 415th largest, depending on who you believe.


Caerffili deserves a Member of parliament in its own right.

I have no real affinity with the coastal conurbation to the north-east of the new constituency, namely Llandudno, Llandudno Junction etc. These places, though not foreign to me, make me feel foreign when visiting them. There, I struggle to hear and speak my native language on the streets and in the shops. The conversations I hear there are not concerned with my experiences and the issues that affect me. I feel the purpose of these places is not for my benefit, but for the benefit of English tourists, retirees and those who serve them. Yet, the concentration of population in the northeast corner of "Aberconwy" will ensure that it is the views of THESE people and the issues affecting THIS area that will dominate the outcome of elections.

The issues I point out here also easily apply to people throughout the rural hinterland of the North Wales coastal strip. The way the constituencies are marked out with a populous Anglo-centric north dominating a more sparsely populated rural Welsh speaking south, is frankly a missed opportunity to better enfranchise and represent the different communities hereabouts.

A fairer and more imaginative reorganisation could easily have been devised if the axis of the communities was west to east (horizontal) rather than north to south (vertical). Thus, the communities of the coastal strip from Llandudno through to Prestatyn, having much in common, would be fairly represented. Also the rural interior respectively, with its market towns like Conwy, Llanrwst, Rhuddlan, Denbigh, Ruthin, Corwen etc, and their associated surrounding villages and farming communities would be enfranchised in a way that more accurately reflects their nature.

The inclusion of Ruthin within the proposed Delyn constituency does not make any sense. Residents do not relate or have much to do with places in the proposed area which has towns/villages mainly in Flintshire.

Ruthin should most definitely be within the proposed Clwyd constituency area - indeed the River Clwyd runs through the town and is situated in what is known as the Vale of Clwyd. I wonder if anyone involved in the proposals is actually aware that constituency is named after the river that runs approximately 35 miles from the south of Ruthin to Rhyl

The Clwydian Range forms a physical boundary so the towns and villages to the west of the top of the Clwydian Range (highest point Moel Famau) should be included in the new constituency Clwyd.

The dividing line should at least be continued in the same continuous line of direction as it is from St Asaph to Bodfari (approximately South east) instead of kinking out to exclude Llandyrnog, Gellifor, Llanbedr Dyffryn Clwyd and Ruthin - which are all places very much in the heart of the Vale of Clwyd. Rather strangely the proposed line of the Clwyd boundary then does change direction then to include Graigfechan What makes most sense is have extend the present Vale of Clwyd constituency to include towns/villages to the south including Ruthin.

To link us to Islwyn is to link us to an area outside of the valley we live in and well away from the closest significant town that impacts on our daily lives which in turn risks us having our concerns drowned out by other more relevant and pertinent issues to the proposed constituency.



I think that the proposed Cardiff West constituency is ridiculous and I strongly disagree. Pontyclun and Cardiff West have very little in common and Pontyclun needs to be able to remain as a resilient and strong community and isn't over powered areas in Cardiff!

This new constituency makes absolutely no sense. Cwm Tawe and the lower Amman Valley which have been part of Neath constituency for decades and Neath Port Talbot for 25 years are now lumped in with Rhaeadr and Bulith Wells. You say your commissioners have taken into account geographic factors, does the mountain range separating Cwm Tawe from the majority of Powys mean nothing, or have you simply drawn a few lines on a map and thought "That'll do!"? For years the boundary between Trebannws and Clydach has made no senese, but rather than get rid of a border that would make sense and include areas like Clydach, Birchgrove and Glais with the rest of the Swansea Valley, you've decided that they are best served in a constituency with Glynneath and Banwen. There are many well forged transport and work links between Neath and the Swansea and Amman valleys, not so much with Cwm Tawe and Brecon. The fact Briton Ferry is still in "Aberafan and Porthcawl" also makes no sense. These proposals are incredibly ill thought out and should be changed at the next stage of the review. Get commissioners who have a basic understanding of the geography and communities of Wales.

It's a completely different community to the one I live in, people I know over there live life very differently, have different approaches to daily life and political views. Additionally their main concern would be with their connection with Carmarthen, not Llanelli, nor will they have a proper understanding of my connection with Llanelli. How would a Llanelli councillor take care of their political needs at all? Seems silly to me.

BCW-9330/ / Prestatyn

This looks and feels, based on the way you've drawn the new constituency borders, to be more focussed on gerrymandering the constituencies of Swansea and Cardiff than anything else, and as usual the North of the country seems to be bearing the brunt of the burden when it comes to partitioning constituencies with historical and community ties. Separating the constituents of Rhyl and Rhuddlan from Prestatyn, Dyserth and Meliden seems particularly egregious given their longstanding community ties and connections.

BCW-9333/ Bridgend

It seems that geographical boundaries are second to the amount of electors within an area, some services would be better delivered on a geographical basis.

Penarth is the Vale of Glamorgan and should be returned to the Vale of Glamorgan. There is no desire to be part of the mess that is Cardiff.

When WAG forced local authorities to proposed mergers to save money the Vale or Glamorgan and County Borough of Bridgend proposed a merger it was refused because it wasn't what Labour wanted to hear.

Both Bridgend and the Vale wanted to protect their community identities and stop themselves from be swamped from the social problems of Swansea and Cardiff.

Yet the Welsh Assembly ignored everyone and keep working toward it through the back door through health boundaries, police boundaries and electoral wards. Even making them selves a Government without another referendum.

People don't want to see their well balanced communities become the extended social housing experiments for areas that lack community cohesion and have a disproportionate emphasis on diversity issues.

The only solution is to close the Welsh assembly via another referendum.

I live 1 mile from Carmarthen town centre yet my proposed new constituency will be Llanelli. I believe this is unacceptable as the remainder of the Llanelli constituency is a completely different demographic from the area in which I live, and so feel I would not be correctly represented.



Powys already takes up half of Wales, struggling massively with poor infrastructure and the higher costs of service provision in a highly rural area, combined with chronic underfunding that does not take these issues into account. Adding another chunk at the top of the county would exacerbate those issues and potentially lower quality of life for those residents.

At this time, when there is a high level of poverty in Wales, it seems tone-deaf and wasteful to be considering zoning changes that will cost millions of pounds to implement and add further complications to statutory and other 'structures' already groaning under the stresses of the effects of Covid and Brexit. Personally, I would rather see investment into Health & Social Care, transport links and promoting businesses that pay a decent, living wage. In the current economic and social climate, I am distrustful of a plan that appears more of a political exercise, and less about the people that should be prioritised.

BCW-9342 / Wrexham

Due to the administrative and cultural links between the villages south west of Wrexham, the are around Ruabon should be part of the Wrexham constituency.

How can you make the border of Carmarthenshire run almost through the town? Shouldn't the county's main town be in the middle of the constituency, not on its border?

What will be the situation of the Community and County Councils in this respect?

Montgomeryshire has no connection with Llangollen and Chirk. I understand the need to even up the number of electors but it would make much more sense if we were being merged with part of B&R, or even Gwynedd/Ceredigion. It also seems strange to take small parts of the Wrexham AND Denbighshire administrative areas into the proposed new Montgomeryshire & Glyndwr seat, when communities have natural ties to other towns in their counties/council areas, economically, socially and culturally. For example Chirk is part of Wrexham borough and to exclude it from Wrexham constituency seems unnatural.

BCW-9345 / Bangor

Firstly, It is inappropriate to have a constituency border running through the town of Bangor, splitting the area of Penrhosgarnedd in half and putting Ysbyty Gwynedd (which is, by any reasonable consideration, in Bangor) in a different constituency from the rest of the town. Ysbyty Gwynedd is an important part of this community, it employs many residents of Bangor as well as caring for the health of local people, and cutting the hospital off from its community in this way will make it impossible for local residents to have proper access to representation when it comes to matters affecting the hospital. Communication will be hampered and elected officials will not be as invested when issues are not within their own constituency, even if they are geographically less than a mile away.

Secondly, I am more broadly concerned by the splitting of the present Arfon constituency and relocating its boundary to be within Bangor, while the eastern boundary of what is presently Aberconwy remains near Colwyn Bay. This artificially forces two quite different areas together, notably areas which have quite different levels of Welsh spoken and whose residents do not focus on the same hinterland. The localised geographical sphere of a Bangor resident looks much more like that of a resident of Caernarfon or Dolgellau than that of a resident of Llandudno or Colwyn Bay, who are more likely to look further east than towards western or southern Gwynedd.

Considering the above, I believe that if the present Arfon constituency cannot be retained due to the need for constituencies with a similar number of electors, then the town of Bangor and its surrounding villages need to be wholly part of Dwyfor-Meirionydd, with the border no further east than Llanfairfechan.



I am unhappy about the proposal to reduce the number of MPs in Wales, and have yet to see any reasonable argument for the move.

Wales already has insufficient voice in Parliament. If we aren't properly represented - if we are to be governed even more wholly by those self-aggrandising, corrupt, mercenary English Tories - then I think I'd like Wales to withdraw from the 'union'. It's not really a Union, is it? It's a hostile takeover.

And, I really DON'T agree to the Boundary Commission for Wales publishing my personal details, but apparently I have to consent to that before I can have my say.

BCW-9347 / Fishguard

There are many areas where public money needs to be spent and this is not one.

I am very concerned that these boundary changes will favour the Conservative party in Wales. How will you ensure this does not happen?

Also the Ceredigion constituency reflects the culture and language of the area. To extend it further south will include geograoc and cultural areas which may be very different. How will the cultural integrity be maintained?



I preferred it as it was. There doesn't seem much sense in poking Bangor into a farflung corner of Aberconwy, when its natural links lie southwards and westwards.



Overall I'm against reducing the number of Welsh MPs. It weakens our voice at Westminster. However if boundary changes are to be made regardless, I would like Gilwern historically a part of Brecknockshire, to be added to the Brecon & Radnor constituency. At the moments the plan is to increase the size of Brecon & Radnor by adding Ystalyfera & Pontardawe, which are historically part of Glamorganshire. If the population of Brecon & Radnor has to be increased, please do it by adding areas that are part of historic Brecknockshire eg: Gilwern, Brynmawr, Cefn-Coed-y-Cymmer & Penderyn, rather than areas from Glamorganshire.

The key issue is that Wales has the Senedd which is responsible for major devolved areas such as Health and Education and these arelikely to expand. This inevitably reduces the workload of Westminster based MPs.

This proposed change is statistical in nature without respect for the terrain or links that make up the South Wales Valleys. For example there is very little in terms of services that anyone in Aberdare would use Merthyr for as it is not even in the same local council. There is the small matter of the two towns being seperated by an actual mountain as well. Like the weather, the views of one valley can be very different to the valley over. I think this proposed boundary change would disenfranchise the more remote communities of Rhigos and Penderyn in particular as any representation would have to be split between 2 major towns and more people. You wouldn't merge an English/Welsh or English/Scottish constituency for these same points. Valleys have their own identity and cannot be split and cut up on a map by completely ignoring the geographic reality of the terrain and how the people interact within it.

BCW-9353/ / Wrexham

Long overdue; it's been grossly unfair that some constituencies in England have had to represent larger populations than many of the existing Welsh constituencies, each Member of Parliament should represent a roughly equal number of members of the public.

Merging areas of Clywd south and Wrexham together better represents the people in the county of Wrexham as well, especially as Clywd as a county has not existed for over 20 years.

Llangunnor for example is regarded as part of Carmarthen as is Pensarn.

Even the towns railway station is due to be moved to the Llanelli constituency.Llanelli Town is 20 miles down the road.

Please take my views into account when deciding on approval for the proposed changes.

BCW-9356/ / Bridgend

The proposal to separate Cefn Glas and Broadlands, two integral parts of Bridgend town out of the Bridgend constituency is illogical. The proposal will put people in these areas at a disadvantage as they are in now way related or linked to Port Talbot in any way. The illogical boundary has obviously been drawn up to tick boxes and with no consideration to the needs of local people.

For the above reasons, I strongly object to the proposals. Thank you.

BCW-9358/ Newbridge

I am happy with the proposed boundaries for Islwyn. Along with the surrounding constituencies this arrangement makes sense with similar communities being represented within the constituencies.

I agree with the new proposal to unite Carmarthenshire as a whole consituuency which will more effectively represent the communities.

BCW-9360/ Llanfairfechan

Why does Ynys Mon need to be a constituency on its own? If boundaries HAVE to change to reduce the number of constituencies, surely the rule of ynys mon having its own constituency could do too? I'm very concerned about the erosion of Welsh culture and language and retaining the rural economy of the area as well and about Westminster gerrymandering. I believe that Ynys mon, Bangor, and the rural part of Aberconwy, which was formerly Caernarfonshire should be one constituency with a name such as Menai. The population in the east of what is now aberconwy has much more in common, in terms of population characteristics, with the Flintshire, Denbighshire costal strip and boundaries could be enlarged to accommodate the remaining part of Aberconwy.

I wish to provide a formal response to the consultation on the initial proposals of the

2023 Parliamentary Review on behalf of the Conservative Group on MonmouthshireCounty Council. This response represents the views of 25 of the 43 elected county councillors in the Monmouthshire local authority. I wish to comment specifically on the proposals for a new 'Monmouthshire' parliamentary constituency.

Given that in Wales we have an additional tier of governance with the Welsh Parliament, I believe it is more important than ever that we take steps to improve public understanding of who represents them. Having a new constituency which is coterminous with the local authority makes perfect sense and will streamline decision-making and accountability. At the moment we liaise with two Members of Parliament, but neither fully represents our county, as the Monmouth constituency contains four electoral divisions from Torfaen (Llanyrafon East & Ponthir, LlanyrafonWest, Croesyceiliog South and Croesyceiliog North) and the lion's share of the Newport East constituency is in the City of Newport. Both our Members of Parliament have to look both ways in engaging with two different local

authorities. The initial proposals would enable the MPs for Monmouthshire, Torfaenand Newport East to engage with one local authority each. The local authorities of Torfaen and Monmouthshire would also be able to build up a close working relationship with a single member of parliament.

Given that parliamentary boundaries from 2023 are set to be different to those for the Welsh Parliament, maintaining some familiarity by following local authority boundaries where possible reduces public confusion and ensures greater accountability.

It has always seemed odd that the current Monmouth constituency contains some Severnside communities such as Portskewett, Sudbrock, Caerwent and Crick, but not Caldicot, Rogiet, Magor or Undy. These communities have far more in common with each other than the rest of the Monmouth constituency has with the areas of Llanyrafon and Croesyceiliog which have better transport and community links to Torfaen. Indeed the only major transport links between Llanyrafon and Croesyceiliog and the rest of the Monmouth constituency are the A472 to Usk and the A4042 to Abergavenny. The communities in Severnside are all joined up by the B4245 and the A48 and Caldicot is the nearest major town with community facilities, such as supermarkets, leisure centre, tourist attractions such as the castle and greenopen spaces. Caldicot is the catchment secondary school for the villages in Severnside. It also seems odd that Caldicot industrial estate is in the Monmouth constituency, but the town of Caldicot is in Newport East. Caldicot is clearly not in

Newport, but its place in a Newport East constituency is obviously confusing. These sensible proposals bring Monmouthshire back together in a single constituency.

The projected electorate for the new Monmouthshire constituency is 72,681 making it an ideal size for a constituency, well within the prescribed range of 69,724 to 77,062.

My group is wholly supportive of the initial proposals for the new parliamentary constituency of 'Monmouthshire'.

As the sitting Member of Parliament for the Monmouth constituency, I have enjoyed representing the constituency since 1999, first as an Assembly Member in the National Assembly for Wales (now Welsh Parliament/Senedd) and then from 2005 asthe Member of Parliament.

Although I believe that no MP likes losing a part of their existing constituency and bydefault losing constituents whom he or she has personally represented for a considerable amount of time, I do find that there is good reason for the Commissionto make these changes at this present time. Therefore, I wish to confirm that I welcome the proposal on three grounds:

- 1) The new constituency would then form the same boundary as the existinglocal authority county of Monmouthshire.
- 2) The name of the constituency would reflect the area it covers -Monmouthshire - whereas at the moment the Monmouth constituency coverstwo counties, 33/42 of the existing Monmouthshire County Council wards and4/24 of the Torfaen county borough wards. In short, the new name of Monmouthshire/Sir Fynwy constituency better reflects



- thegeography of the seat, accountability and identity.
- 3) With the aim to make constituencies more equal in voter numbers and reflectpopulation changes across the whole UK, each proposed constituency (apartfrom Ynys Mon) must have an electorate that is no less than 95% and no more than 105% of the UK electoral quota. Your estimated electorate for thenew Monmouthshire constituency is 72,681 making it an ideal size for a constituency and well within the range of 69,724 to 77,062 that the Commission is trying to achieve.

As the Member of Parliament for Monmouth, I have always found that the name of the current constituency often confuses residents who either live in the Torfaen part of the constituency (four wards) or those who live in parts of Monmouthshire, other than Monmouth. The new constituency of Monmouthshire would help with identity forresidents and accountability for the new Member of Parliament, and assist overall with providing a sense of community within its existing local ties.

To close, I welcome the proposal for the new Monmouthshire/Sir Fynwy constituencyas outlined in the 2023 Parliamentary Boundary Review by the Boundary Commission for Wales.

I wholeheartedly disagree with the proposed changes for Ceredigion and Penbrokeshire. The new constituency simply clumps two very different areas together and is a incredibly anti-democratic way of ensuring that people in these areas are not heard. Consistencies should be designated BY AREA NOT POPULATION. To mash Ceredigion and Pembrokeshire together, with different political (Plaid v Conservatives), Cultural (Predominantly Welsh speaking vs Predominantly English speaking) and economically (Pembrokeshire has distinctly different finances to Ceredigion and much less poverty) is extremely dangerous andcrass. I want to voice my strong disapproval at this proposal to reduce Welsh representation in Westminster. I honestly feel this consultation is a pointless exercise as the UK Government have already made their decision to reduce Welsh representation, meaning communities with nothing in common will be lumped together, and the already small voice of Wales in Westminster will decrease further. This proposal has strengthened my support for Welsh Independence.

BCW-9411/ / Cardigan

The proposed plan is much better. Having lived and worked in Ceredigion all my life, and now over the border very slightly into Pembrokeshire, I consider what happens in Ceredigion more important to me than the North of Pembrokeshire.



This constituency of Swansea East and Neath downgrades the influence of a very populous town. Neath deserves it's own constituency and is not a suburb of Swansea. It is quite clear to me and a large amount of voters in the constituency that this is just to increase the Conservative share of the vote in order to challenge Labour and in some cases Plaid Cymru in these constituencies. It's an authoritarian power grab and must be stopped.

BCW-9413/ Neath Abbey

This is my second comment, but I would like to also point out that the constituency of Swansea East & Neath straddles 2 councils. Would it not be a better proposal for the Neath Port Talbot Council area to be classed as a constituency by combining Neath and Aberavon current constituencies instead of combining Neath with Swansea East?

My solution would be to make the wards in the document I have attached into one constituency, as then at least the issues in the constituency cover the same council area.



BCW-9414/ / Llandudno

I believe the proposals for the Aberconwy area (and North wales more widely) do not reflect local ties and geographic realities and should be revised. All the seats seem to have been created on a west to east basis, with an expanded Dwyfor Meirionydd seat as the basic building block. This is an error as it ignores many of the realities of the area and far more natural and viable seats can be created if one has more of a fundamental rethink of the seats in the north. I attach an image of my counter proposals. Please note, all the seats depicted fall within the electorate range required of the review and so work for the purposes proposed.

Firstly, the Llandudno and Conwy areas have little in common with Bangor socially or economically and should be in a seat with Colwyn Bay, which would far better reflect realities and links on the ground. The inclusion of Llandrillo yn Rhos and Mochdre wards in Aberconwy is necessary to make up the required electorate but, carves up the urban area of Colwyn Bay, when if you look at the wider seat and urban area pairings in North Wales, this is completely unnecessary.

While Llandudno and Conwy were included in the old Conway/Conwy seats with Bangor, this was more a product of the two former towns having been part of Caernarfonshire, and then Gwynedd, rather than any links between the two areas. Since the reorganisation of authorities in 1995, local boundaries have far more reflected the fact that Llandudno, Conwy and Colwyn Bay are essentially one contiguous urban area. The parliamentary seats should reflect these realities. Local residents shop, work and socialise on a daily basis between the three towns. Links with Bangor are far more tenuous for local residents, despite the A55.


Similarly, Bangor and Caernarfon are a natural pairing for a constituency and the present Arfon seat was a natural and sound unit. This seat should be expanded to take in the Llyn Peninsular, rather than Bangor be included in Aberconwy, especially as the boundaries around Bangor, as currently proposed, are extremely tight and cut off the town's hinterland. My proposed alternative plan in the attached image shows what I think is a more natural seat, combing Bangor and Caernarfon, with the Llyn Peninsular, and those parts of the County Borough of Conwy that look towards Bangor as their main town, such as Llanfairfechan. I would call this seat Caernarfon as the central town for the constituency.

Turning to alternatives to Aberconwy, my counter proposals in the image unite all the main urban areas of the County Borough of Conwy along the coast, with their immediate hinterland. These areas resemble one another socially, linguistically and form a natural physical and economic unit, stretching from Conwy Town over to Kinmel Bay. I would propose this seat is called Llandudno and Colwyn as the two largest and most well-known towns in the area. While Conwy has been used for seats in the past, the old 1951-2010 Conway/Conwy seat covered a far different area and the same name is is use for both a county and ward, neither of which are the

same area as the proposed seat. It would, in part, also mark a break with Aberconwy and therefore give the new seat a new identity as a new seat covering a new area, but one which would be immediately identifiable to most residents and external commentators.

Elsewhere in North Wales, I have proposed a seat covering Rhyl, Prestatyn and the Flintshire coast - again a natural unit for a parliamentary seat, one covering Wrexham and the Maelor, and two others covering more rural areas. One of these is an expanded version of the old Clwyd South West seat, which existed prior to 1997, but now including areas of the Conwy Valley. The final seat is one covering Montgomeryshire and Meirionydd. This seat is large in size but works well on the ground and many areas of western Montgomeryshire, such as Machynlleth resemble many parts of southern Meirionydd and there exists close ties between the two areas.

I believe my counter proposals for Aberconwy and for North wales more generally are far more reflective of local ties and topographical and sociological realities than the initial proposals. They also work from an electorate perspective given the requirement incumbent upon the commission and have no knock on effect on seats in other regions of Wales. I hope that you will look upon my proposals with interest and will be glad to expand on any of my proposals or thoughts if called upon.



BCW-9415/ Cardiff

Pontyclun isn't in the same county as Cardiff so it should not be in the same electoral district as Cardiff West. 

BCW-9419/ Tregynon

I believe that these proposals are very good, especially as they keep the historic county and constituency of Montgomeryshire intact as well as adding other local neighbouring communities that have similar landscapes and needs.

It is a vital job to reorganise the Parliamentary map of Wales so it better represents the modern demographics of the population; and this proposal achieves this.

I support the proposal.

The communities along the B4245 and to a lesser degree the A48 east of Newport have a long association with each other and a great deal of interdependence. Issues common to one are frequently common to the others. Breaking up these communities through different parliamentary constituencies will make it harder to coordinate effective and efficient solutions to these common problems.



Whilst I am fully in agreement with streamlining constituencies, Ceredigion County Council have been appalling with ringfencing resources to favoured areas. Unfortunately Aberystwyth drew the short straw with the highest council taxation and lack of services, communal facilities, no communication and no consultations with residents or businesses, no improvement plans for the town centre, no parking and unworkable road closures. Extending the area to the South will only widen the gap further with already stretched resources being sent to ensure St David's and the coast bring in more revenue. We understand Covid restrictions but Aber has been ignored, our town is dying slowly, businesses have moved out because footfall has been crucified with road closures for Covid. They are not even allowing their own councillors to speak out. We have a vote of no confidence in this councils representatives so if you do change the area, please change the full time non elected members to give us a chance.

BCW-9422 / Swansea

The Brecon constituency is already too large geographically. This proposal to extend it even further to the south is ludicrous. It would make far more sense to divide it in the middle and make it two smaller and thus more manageable constituencies. It appears that the current government is only concerned with tinkering with boundary changes for their own benefit with not a thought for the people who should be their first priority.

BCW-9423 / Chepstow

These boundary changes are not fair. Wales is already marginalised by central government and this will make that marginalisation worse.

Quite frankly embarrassing that most of the city of Newport west of the Usk is now part of Newport East. Constituency boundaries aren't just meant to reflect population, or the political objectives of any one party.

These communities deserve the respect of representation that preserves the traditional boundary.

BCW-9425 / Y Felinheli

I think it is necessary to keep the whole of Arfon together....the proposed Aberconwy and Dwyfor Meirionnydd constituencies leaves Arfon split in half, but both from a community perspective, and cultural one, Bangor and Ogwen belong to Arfon, and Gwynedd, rather than Aberconwy. The currently propsal currently splits a large urban area of Bangor in half (Penrhosgarnedd) and also splits the village of Rhiwlas off from its closest linked towns and villages - Bangor, and Bethesda. Rhiwlas itself has strong links to both Bangor and Bethesda; most people who live in Rhiwlas work in Bangor/Arfon, and the primary school's secondary catchment areas are Ysgol Dyffryn Ogwen, in Bethesda, and Ysgol Tryfan and Ysgol Friars in Bangor. Culturally there is quite a big divide between the Bangor-Ogwen area and Conwy - it's needs to be bought back in and joined with the rest of Arfon.

I know it's difficult with the narrow scope you've been given for constituency populations sizes, but I'd suggest that preferably, all of Bangor-Ogwen should fall into Dwyfor Meirionnydd (and renamed Gwynedd, by the looks of it) using the Gwynedd/Conwy county boundary as the boundary, or alternatively that Rhiwlas and Penrhosgarnedd areas are moved over to stay with Bangor-Ogwen, and the boundary is rather weirdly drawn up from between Bangor and Felinheli, having Felinheli, Bethel, Deiniolen, Llanberis etc in Dwyfor Meirionnydd, and having all of Bangor, Penrhosgarnedd, Rhiwlas, Caerhun, Glasinfryn, Tregarth, Mynydd Llandegai and Bethesda together in whichever constituency in lands. Though, Dwyfor Meirion would be the preference.

BCW-9426 / A Rhos on sea

Dear Commission Secretary,

Gower Society comments on the proposed name 'Swansea West and Gower' Amended names proposed: 'Gower Peninsula and Swansea West' or 'Gower and SwanseaWest'

The Gower Society is a CIO (Charitable Incorporated Organisation) which has grown from its origins as a charity set up in 1948; this preceded the designation in 1956 of the major part of the Gower Peninsula as the first A.O.N.B. (Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty) in the UK.

The Gower Society's Main Committee notes the Commission's invitation in its 2021 Report to offer comments on its proposals for reorganising the parliamentary political constituencies in Wales.

The Gower Society understands and supports the Commission's aim to try to even-up thenumber of persons in any one constituency and accepts that the political boundary area changes close to those suggested locally are reasonable.

However it objects to the manner in which the word Gower - a very special word in the UKhistory - is further demeaned in these proposals.

It is demeaned by not calling the new constituency 'Gower and Swansea West'; this was, after all, what the 2016 predecessor of this Commission update itself actually proposed tocall it.

Swansea's main history is mainly associated with the important part it played in the first industrial revolution. Unlike many cities elsewhere in the UK it's earlier years are less rich inhistorical attributes, and if one word stands out in a history that goes back over 800 years it is the word GOWER. This was the name given to the ancient Marcher Lordship granted by King John to William III de Braos (Breos) in the year 1203, and which covered an area verysimilar to that covered by the present City and County of Swansea. Gower was the anglicised version of the Welsh Gwyr, a commute within the cantref of Eginog with a history extending hundreds of years before the Marcher Lordship.

These days many peoples first association with the word may run no deeper than holiday trips to 'Gower' - usually meaning seaside trips to the Gower Peninsula (itself only a small part of historical Gower). It would be highly

regrettable culturally for Swansea and the UK ifthe parliamentary Commission were to make any further inroads into its significance.

In conclusion, then, the Gower Society strongly objects to the Commission's proposed name. The Society's preferred name is the one originally suggested five years ago, of 'Gower Peninsula and Swansea West'. (This would emphasise that just as the term Swansea West covers only a small part of Swansea, so the term 'Gower Peninsula' coversonly a small part of Gower). It's second choice would be 'Gower and Swansea West'.

I am generally supportive of the proposals given the constraints.

However, the proposed 'Monmouthshire' constituency would be better retaining the existing name 'Monmouth'. As a resident of Newport in Monmouthshire, it is already confusing having a local government area that does not cover the entire county, without compounding the confusion with a Parliamentary constituency that does not either.



I am opposed to any reduction in the number of seats in Wales. This will reduce the representation of Wales at Westminster and will lead to England having even more dominance in the United Kingdom.



Why is it that Rhigos and Penderyn are the ones that always get moved about. I do not want to be part of Merthyr they're the poorest, their council is awful. Please do not move us. I work in a school kitchen and even the menus in RCT are much nicer and better.

BCW-9435 / Llanelli

Llanelli Town Council wishes to note it's objections to the initial proposals for the Llanelli constituency.

It is the view of the Council that the inclusion of the Carmarthenshire County Council Llangunnor Ward along with the newly created Llangyndeyrn Ward will cause areas that should naturally form part of any Carmarthen based constituency being within the proposed Llanelli constituency. This is an unsustainable and inappropriate situation as locations such as:

Carmarthen railway station Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Bro Myrddin

Would be represented by the Llanelli MP. It is clear that there can be no justification for these being included in the Llanelli proposals and should obviously be retained in the proposed Caerfyrddin constituency.

Llangunnor ward has a population of 2,194
The newly formed Llangyndeyrn ward is suggested to have a population of 4073

As an alternative the Council would suggest the inclusion of the Saron and Penygroes wards into Llanelli, their combined populations are 5,768.

The Llanelli constituency would then have a total electors of around 71,500, which would be within the recommendations.



Bethesda Community Council is not happy with the initial proposals, as Arfon will disappear! We feel that a more natural fit – demographically and linguistically – would be to join with Meirion/Dwyfor.



Why must we reduce our wards in wales? For decades the Cynon valley, alongside other wards in wales have had appropriate representation in parliament. Also, joining aberdare with Merthyr is not a proportionate to the population of the valley as Merthyr will have the focus over aberdare as it is a far larger area. Cynon valley is geography suited too be it's own ward and it always should be. By reducing the wards in wales, you are reducing the voice of wales!

BCW-9438 / Llansantffraid

I am writing to the Welsh Boundary Commission to support the boundary change proposals for the historic community of Montgomeryshire being retained in the proposed new and enlarged constituency of Montgomeryshire and Glyndwr.

BCW-9439 / Carmarthen

Llandyfaelog Community Council wishes to note it's objection to the proposal to include the Community within the boundaries of the proposed Llanelli constituency.

The Boundary Commission for Wales' proposals do not appear to take account of the changes proposed to the local wards for Carmarthenshire County Council this leads to a confusing picture in relation to the proposal.

The Community Council does not believe that the proposals are appropriate as the Llandyfaelog Community area does not have any connection with Llanelli and should be included in a constituency boundary with Carmarthen. The proposals also provide for some very unfortunate and clearly inappropriate outcomes as follows:

The inclusion of Llangunnor (a suburb of Carmarthen) in the Llanelli constituency causes the Carmarthen Railway Station to be included in Llanelli constituency;

The inclusion of the Llandyfaelog Community in the Llanelli constituency causes Ysgol Gyfun Gymraeg Bro Myrddin (a school serving almost exclusively areas outside of Llanelli constituency even on these proposed boundaries) to be included in Llanelli constituency.

Both of these inclusions are clearly inappropriate.

A more sensible approach would be to include Ammanford Town wards of Ammanford and Pontamman (2022 electorate 4,194) along with Betws (1,896) both of which formed part of the Llanelli constituency up until 1997 in the Llanelli constituency instead of Llandyfaelog, Llangyndeyrn or Llangunnor Communities (2022 electorate - 6,267).

The Boundary Commission for Wales has already taken the wholly inappropriate decision to split the Carmarthenshire County Council St Ishmaels Ward and include the two Communities of Llandyfaelog and St Ishmaels into the Llangyndeyrn and Kidwelly Wards respectively. This initial proposal for the UK Parliamentary constituencies is perhaps even more inappropriate and should be urgently reconsidered.

We are devastated to hear that you may include our property to be listed as part of Colwyn Bay. where we live is a beautiful and select area and part of the village with absolutely no connection to Colwyn Bay.

Are you aware of the record of crime in Colwyn Bay? It is used for drug rehab and ex prisoner housing, antisocial behaviour is rife (a place we would not dream of visiting after dark and only use to access the railway station).

Also we dread to think how much our house and car insurances would increase if we were classed as part of Colwyn Bay.

Please re consider your proposal.

BCW-9442 / / Neath

Whilst I appreciate that my constituency isn't being changed much, I feel the reduction of Them as a whole in Wales is totally unnecessary and will cause a great deal of angst amongst communities affected.

BCW-9443 / Llangollen

As frequently happens Llangollen and the Dee Valley is treated as an after thought, when it is a significant and unique inland tourist destination set in a UNESCO World Heritage Site and AoNB. It has no real infinity with Mid-Wales and the politics of that area is likely to dominate and ignore the political affiliations of the cultural, lifestyle and environment of the Dee Valley.

In terms of Local Authority area it is currently part of Denbighshire CC who already treat it with disrespect concentrating resources on their coastal region and inland towns of Ruthin and Denbighshire. Llangollen actually has more affiliation with Wrexham being only twelve miles from Wrexham town and a handful of miles from the boundary at Trevor/Acrefair where the Pontcysyllte Aqueduct is located which centres the World Heritage Site.

BCW-9444 / Caernarfon

It doesn't make any sense to merge Arfon with Dwyfor Meirionnydd. It's not fair to the Member of Parliament or the electorate. Travelling to meet an MP is difficult enough in a rural area, but this distance is beyond reason e.g., if an MP is holding a surgery in Caernarfon, it isn't fair to those who live in Aberdovey – over an hour and a half's travel one way!

Also, north Wales is almost the most difficult ward from which to get to London and expecting an MP to represent so many more constituents and a much larger area, in addition to travelling so far, is completely unreasonable. A rural population cannot be compared to a civic population – the challenges are much greater. I also believe that there is a greater demand for an MP's services in poor, rural areas overall, in comparison with prosperous, populous areas. I implore you to reconsider the Arfon boundary and to keep the Arfon and Dwyfor Meirionnydd seats separate, for everyone's benefit. Thank you,

BCW-9446 / Cwmbran

I welcome the proposal to include Croesyceiliog and Llanyrafon in the Torfaen constituency. It makes sense for the whole of the town of Cwmbran to fall within the same constituency.

BCW-9447 / _____ / Ruthin

I object to Ruthin being included into Delyn. The town is IN the Vale of Clwyd, both physically as well as electorally - it is NOT Delyn/Flintshire in any way, shape or form. The boundary should be the Clwydian range. Having lived in the Dekyn catchment area for c35 years, I NEVER wish to be a part of it again.

BCW-9448 / Llanrhystud

To warrant the salaries paid to cheif executives and other senior member of staff, I totally agree the number of residents in any given area needs to be increased to warrant these salaries and I fully support the proposed changes to the boundaries.

BCW-9449 / Port Talbot

I live in the Afan Valley. The main road out side my home and the river Afan on our property boundaries, directly follow the route of the river Afan from the upper reaches of Afan Valley to Port Talbot and Aberavon Beach. Therefore, my links are within the same valley as Oakwood, Cwmavon, Cymmer, Port Talbot town and Aberavon.

I and my neighbour's have no links, affiliation or reason to be annexed with the new proposed area Swansea East and Neath and feel strongly that we should be placed electorally in the existing constituency Aberafan or the new constituency of Aberafan Porthcawl.

I do not feel my needs can be successfully represented in a constituency which is not even geographically in the same valley that I live in.

It is absurd and beyond belief to remove a small section of a main road through the Afan Valley (Dan y Bont) and place it in a neighbouring valley Constituency i.e. a Constituency representing Swansea East and Neath.

Matters that affect me are the same as those affecting people of the Afan Valley. How then can I be effectively be represented by a MP representing people of Swansea East and Neath?

Pontrhydyfen was many years ago wrongly placed in Neath Borough Council and this is the opportunity to sensibly reposition Pontrhydyfen boundaries in it's rightful geographical position and Constituency, reattached to the Afan Valley.

BCW-9450 / Bridgend

I was opposed to Neath and Port Talbot becoming one and i am greatly opposed to the Bridgend being changed and like Neath i will continue to use the single town and not the joint

My nearest hospital is 4 miles away at Ystrad Mynach. The University Hospital of Wales, Cardiff is 8 miles away. The Royal Gwent Hospital is 12 miles Away. I was recently referred to the new hospital near Caerleon? 20 miles away. If I have a heart attack I will never make it. If my neighbour has a baby it will be born in a lay-by traffic jam on the M4. I drove past three hospitals to get my treatment, a round trip of 40 miles. Rewrite the boundaries around the nearest hospitals.

BCW-9452 / Porthcawl

BCBC is currently endeavouring to build on two sites in Porthcawl, Salt Lake and Sandy Bay. These projects will have a significant impact on this town, it's community and the county. The boundary changes will occur shortly. Will/should Aberafon become involved in these projects and in the decision making process?



There are no real historic and cultural ties between Newport west and Caerphilly. Services are very separate. The proposed constituency crosses over a number of local authorities and does not reflect any common links

BCW-9454 / / Ystrad Meurig

The proposed changes to Ceredigion are culturally inappropriate and colonial. Ceredigion's unique identity as a Welsh speaking, Liberal and progressive county should be protected, respected and represented in Parliament. The constituents of the coastal areas of Pembrokeshire are usually tory voting, English retirees and second home owners so this proposed change looks like a tory power grab.

BCW-9455 / Ferryside

FERRYSIDE HAS ALWAYS COME UNDER CARMARTHEN, WHICH IS OUR NEAREST TOWN FOR SHOPPING, SCHOOLS, WORK, SOCIALISING. WE DO NOT WANT TO COME UNDER LLANELLY CONSTITUENCY. LEAVE OUR AREA ALONE. IF WE ARE MOVED AREA, I WILL NO LONGER TAKE PART IN ELECTIONS!

BCW-9456 / Denbigh

Ruthin in the proposed map will fall within the new constituency of Delyn.

Between Ruthin and the rest of the Delyn constituency is a physical barrier of the Clwyd Mountain range.

There are no historical, linguistic or cultural links between Ruthin and Flint, Holywell, Mold and Bagillt or even Prestatyn (even though Prestatyn and Ruthin are within the same County.) It would be much more logical if Ruthin and other areas presently included in the Delyn constituency that fall to the West of the Clwydian Range to be placed within the Clwyd constituency as there are strong historical, linguistic and cultural links between Denbigh and Ruthin and other communities within the Vale of Clwyd.

From a working point of view for any MP working this constituency, it would also make sense for them to serve an area with close links where common themes might arise for them to take up in Westminster.

On a practical side, people living in outlying villages such as Bontuchel, Cyfylliog, Pwllglas, Llanrhaeadr, Clawddnewydd use Ruthin as their main place for shopping and leisure but they would be in a different constituency.

But also the main administrative centre for Denbighshire County Council is in Ruthin Town therefore if someone in the named villages above but also in a wider context of Denbigh, St. Asaph or even Rhyl wish to approach their (Clwyd) MP to raise a concern or complaint with Denbighshire County County that MP will have to do so through Denbighshire CC main office which is Ruthin, which would be in another constituency if these proposals go through.

At a political level, there is no historic link between Ruthin and the Delyn area but also with the physical barrier of the Clwydian hills between Ruthin and the rest of the Delyn constituency it is very likely that Ruthin will become a forgotten rump within that constituency.

BCW-9457 / Wrexham

The commissioners have clearly not taken into account local geography as connected neighbouring communities are being split according to these proposed boundary hanged

BCW-9458 / Merthyr Tydfil

I disagree with the plan to link Merthyr Tydfil with the northern part of the Cynon Valley. It is a considerable time since the 2 areas were linked politically.

The previous boundary commission proposal of keeping Merthyr Tydfil and an enlarged Rhymney Constituency makes more sense to me.

I appreciate that adding all the previously proposed Wards would take us over the number of electors so I suggest that Ystrad Mynach Ward could be excluded from the revised Constituency and linked with Pontypridd instead.

The upper Rhymney valley has strong links with Merthyr Tydfil including using Prince Charles Hospital for emergency and planned hospital services, for retail and leisure purposes.

Some of the "links" for other proposed Constituencies also don't make sense but I will leave their constuents to comment on those.

The Northern Wards of Aberdare wouldn't traditionally come to Merthyr Tydfil for retail and leisure, though I accept they are part of Cwm Taf UHB so would come to PCH for some services.

Residents from Aberdare are called "snakes" by Merthyr Tydfil residents who have not forgotten their miners breaking the 1926 strike. Animosity remains today.

BCW-9459 / Clunderwen

I feel that the Maenclochog area should be in the same constituency as North Pembrokeshire, rather than South Pembrokeshire.

Culturally and linguistically, the area north of Clunderwen is very similar to the north of the county and is very different in nature to the middle and south of the county.

BCW-9460 / Swansea

Another way of trying to cut the number of Labour MPs in Parliament.

BCW-9461 / Abergele

This looks a sensible solution to the overall picture

BCW-9462 / Llangefni

The proposed constituency of Dwyfor Meirionnydd is far too big. It's true that the population is small, but that should be counterbalanced by an elected member's ability to be visible to all parts of the constituency. This is completely impractical with the area that's being proposed.

It's an insult that Wales is seeing such a reduction in its number of elected members. This does nothing to conceal the lie that is known as the 'United' Kingdom. It appears that the British establishment does not care about Wales at all.

BCW-9463 / Lebbw Vale

The proposal to merge constituencies is scandalous. At a time when people are disillusioned with politics, and at a time when they feel that their voices are not being heard, this will only serve to exacerbate those concerns.

This is, purely and simply, disenfranchisement.

That Wales, as a nation, will be represented by just 30 MPs and not 42 is tantamount to saying that our voices are no longer important.

Purely and simply, I will no longer vote in Parliamentary elections if this scheme bears fruition as, not only does this proposal make my seat even less competitive (thereby diluting my vote even further), my MP will be expected to cover a larger area.

This is undemocratic, and is an act of vandalism against democracy.

BCW-9464 / Aberdare

I am concerned at the prospect of the Cynon Valley being divided between Pontypridd and Merthyr. To begin, Merthyr and the Cynon Valley are divided geographically quite obviously. This geographic divide will hinder any kind of amalgamation. Also, these areas are in separate councils with different policies, protocols and priorities. This complicates matters even further, particularly if there is to be effective, equal and fair representation for all residents.

Cynon is a large, densely populated Valley with complex social and economic issues. Dividing us between two other equally populated areas, with needs and concerns of their own will be detrimental for us, not beneficial.

We are not simply talking about the movement of some lines on a map here. This is not a tweak where one small area is moved into another in order to keep statistics in balance. If this plan goes ahead, the voice of the entire Cynon Valley will be lost. This would be a breach of our social, cultural and economic rights.



Are plans in place to align these proposed bounderies with County Councils and the Senedd.

In order to get the right number of voters in the constituency, a map has been drawn which bears no resemblance to natural relationships. Neath and even more so Pontadulais are not related in any way to Brecon and Radnor, the constituency is shaped like a dogs dinner just to fit the numbers. This s doesn't make any sense at all.

BCW-9467 / / Trelawnyd

The costs for doing this must be astronomical . To change all the boundary signs is a cost just on its own . I am also concerned that the extra work out MP will have to do will mean no doubt they will have more staff paid for with expenses that will come from tax payers . I think things should be left alone .



Pontardawe has very little in common with Brecon and Radnor and much more with Swansea or Neath. It would fit better into one of the new Swansea constituencies.

BCW-9469 / Llandudno

Llandudno and Bangor have a very different demographic and should not be in the same group as they would require their MP to have a different view and skill to each other. Llandudno and Conwy area should be with the Colwyn Bay Area that all share the same county and coastal issues. All deal with tourism and a large migration of retiring people to the area who vote based on their past and historic views. The Bangor area is more aligned to Caernarfon and Gwynedd area with language considerations and a lack of infrastructure for work for their community. Please consider the culture of the area as well as the population numbers as these factors are important to each area and representation is required.

BCW-9470 / Llanddulas

I object as a Rate paying resident of Llanddulas most strenuously to the boundary being extended any further East of the Afon Clwyd at Rhyl and encompassing any part of the original part of The town of Rhyl and any part of County of Denbighshire.

The cost to present Conwy Ratepayers of taking on one of the most deprived parts of Wales in the West Rhyl ward will be a political and financial white elephant that CCBC residents can ill afford under the present financial restraints as now being faced with services being reduced!

The Welsh Government cannot be taken seriously when it moves political voting goal posts to hold further control of constituencies and with the result that hard working County Councillors will lose their present seats.

This is unacceptable to the majority of honest voters.

I state this manoeuvre is a violation of the electorates right to proper representation!

I was shocked to read the Welsh translation of your 2023 Parliamentary Review — Initial Proposals. https://comffin-cymru.gov.uk/tudalen/arolwg-seneddol-2023-cynigion-cychwynnol

The whole page is riddled with elementary mistakes of spelling and grammar which really undermine the authority of the Boundary Commission for Wales. Presumably public money has been spent on the translation, and the Welsh-speaking public has a right to see decent, correct Welsh. The whole page needs to be thoroughly checked by an experienced translator. The accompanying documents seem to have been properly proof-read so it is a pity that you are let down by the page that your readers first encounter.

As to the individual names, etc. I enclose a partial (and initial) list of names which I think need to be reconsidered:

- 1. Aberhonddu a Maesyfed: this is wrong since Aberhonddu is the name for Brecon town, not (and never) Breconshire. The proper term in Welsh is **Brycheiniog a Maesyfed.**
- 2. Preseli: this is incorrect. The correct forms are either **Preselau or Presely.**
- 3. Aberdar: should be Aberdâr.
- 4. Eglwysbach: (Aberconwy) should be Eglwys-bach
- 5. Bettws-y-Coed: should be **Betws-y-coed**
- 6. Tregarth a Mynydd Llandygai: should be Tre-garth a Mynydd Llandygái
- 7. Deganwy: should be **Degannwy** because of its derivation from Decanti (nt > nn).
- 8. Craig-y-Don: for consistency, **Craig-y-don**, as Pant-yr-afon.
- 9. Nantyglo: should be Nant-y-glo
- 10. Llanafanfawr: should be Llanafan Fawr
- 11. Felin-fâch: no accent on fach > Felin-fach
- 12 Maescar: should be Maes-car
- 13 Godre'r graig: should be Godre'r-graig.
- 14 Llangors: should be **Llan-gors**
- 15 Dyserth a Threcoed: should be **Diserth a Thre-coed**
- 16 Llanllyr: should be **Llanlly^r** (y with a circumflex on it).
- 17 Clas-ar-Wy: should be Y Clas-ar-Wy
- 18 Bryncoch : should be **Bryn-coch**
- 19 Trelech: should be Tre-lech
- 20 Cilycwm: should be Cil-y-cwm
- 21 Penygroes (Carmarthen): should be **Pen-y-groes**
- 22 Hendy-gwyn-ar-daf: should be **Hendy-gwyn ar Daf** [or -ar-Daf]

There are **many**, **many more to be corrected**, and the Boundary Commission could make a good start on this itself by consulting the list of standard Welsh place-names provided on the website of the Welsh Language Commissioner

If I have time and energy I will try to look through all the regions, but the above will give you some idea of the scale of your problem as it stands. The most serious of these, as noted above is using Aberhonddu a Maesyfed instead of **Brycheiniog a Maesyfed** for 'Brecon and Radnor'. You have inconsistency in Meirionydd/Meirionydd. The correct form from the point of view of its derivation is **Meirionydd** (with one n), and this is the form I use myself. But the form with -nn-has spread to the extent that it is thought by some to be in some way correct. Degannwy has also suffered like this, being wrongly thought to be Deganwy, a form which is now thought by some to be acceptable.

I hope these suggestions are of some help. I am writing in English because I wanted to make sure the points are made clear to all who are dealing with this huge task. I fear the Welsh might be translated by someone not up to the job.

I hope to send more corrections when I can.

I write on behalf of Neath Town Council who wish to comment on the proposed Westminster Boundary Changes affecting the current Neath and Swansea East Constituencies.

Members comments include:-

Members feel that these proposals are ill thought out and do not take into account social, cultural, political, and current Local Authority and Sennedd boundaries.

The vast majority of Neath constituents do not regard themselves has having any social or cultural connections to those of Swansea East and certainly it is just as true that Swansea East residents who will have the same regard for those of the Neath area. A good example of that can be seen in the division that still exists in both communities over the amalgamation of their Rugby Teams into the Regional Side the Ospreys with many residents of both communities vowing never to support what they view as a mongrel side.

Additionally, both constituencies have a past strongly association with heavy industry, Coal, Steel and Copper. Although that is mainly historical, that past is still deeply embedded in the minds of its inhabitants. They regard themselves as being from an industrial background and not that of a rural farming background. Therefore the proposal to sever the communities of the upper Swansea Valley like Pontardawe, Ystalyfera, Gwauncaegurwen etc. from its current connection to the Neath Constituency makes no sense.

Another issue with the proposed changes is, currently both constituencies are represented by one Westminster MP, one Sennedd Member and one Local Authority Member. The changes will mean that everyone affected by them will be represented by separate Local Authorities and Sennedd Members, a situation that can only cause confusion.

Having seen the proposals I am dismayed that the Cynon Valley is being sliced in half - one half being added to the Merthyr Tydfil constituency.

There are several reasons why this is totally unacceptable:

- 1. Merthyr Tydfil will dominate the constituency and as such Cynon Valley will become an afterthought in any decisions.
- 2. The Cynon Valley is facing challenges and issues that affect the area as a whole: lack of investment, lack of employment opportunities, social issues, poverty. Merthyr Tydfil is an area that in recent times has seen investment in leisure and tourist sectors with positive consequences on employment and the profile of the area. Plus there are plans to further develop more of the same: developing the historical/tourist portential of Cynfarthfa Castle as a result of substantial investment, plans for an indoor ski centre and hotel. In contrast Aberdare and the Cynon Valley have been neglected as far as tourism and investment and is seen as the poor relation alongside Merthyr Tydfil.
- 3. As a consequence of 2, the Cynon Valley needs representation to fight for improvements and investment rather a representative who sees Merthyr as the jewel in the crown and Aberdare and Cynon North as an after thought.
- 4. Geographically and historically Aberdare/North Cynon and Merthyr Tydfil have never been closely aligned. Your proposal is akin to a shot gun wedding.

I hope that common sense and logic will prevail and you realise that what you propose is totally unrealistic and represents the death knell for the North Cynon Valley and Aberdare.

Merthyr Tydfil is a County Borough which previously has been tied with Rhymney. Now all of a sudden BCW want to tie Merthyr with Aberdare, which had its own MP!

Is it appropriate for one MP to represent a minimum of 67,000 people. Hardly, I disagree with the proposals.

I am quite frankly confused by the new boundaries being created.

Merging Swansea West with Gower (the latter being my constituency) has no understandable benefit, the new boundary does not seem to increase the chance of different parties winning in the Labour stronghold at all; it needs to be redrawn in order to give other parties a fairer, more democratic chance - or you might as well make Swansea and Gower a single constituency.

Judging by Bridgend being redrawn into a Labour constituency, it seems there is no interest in democracy in these new boundaries.

Though the Conservative Party seems to gain some 12 seats, the Caerfyrddin seat, which was previously the Ceredigion seat and Carmarthenshire East and Dinefwr seat, is also given to the Conservative Party; this results in Plaid Cymru losing two seats.

I am thoroughly disappointed with these changes; especially considering that they are on the basis of Wales (40 seats) having too many seats in comparison to England (533 seats), the country which controls approximately 80% of UK seats; we are now seeing more seats being transferred to England from Wales and Scotland (59 seats).

Needless to say, it seems that - though the Conservative Party are in a better balance with Labour - smaller parties will no longer benefit, Plaid Cymru is especially a victim of an accidental duocracy resulting from these boundary reforms.

I strongly urge the boundary commission, if they cannot keep boundaries as they currently are, to redraw their boundaries to allow smaller parties to have a chance in our elections; to create a fairer chance especially for smaller parties.



I think the fact that the english government is making us have less MP's is despicable and something that welsh ministers should be fighting against.

I supported the pattern of constituencies proposed for north Wales. On the whole, they created constituencies representing areas which differed in character. In my opinion, north Wales comprises, roughly, three different types of area: the coast, the industrial area of Deeside and Wrexham, with the remainder being largely rural. The areas have different problems, and their elected representatives need to be able to concentrate on them. I am strongly of the opinion that I succeeded in creating constituencies which represent the above areas. The pattern of constituencies follows to a large extent the contents of the 2018 Proposals. The Commission therefore has a basis for considering their proposals, and this report forms a foundation for so doing.

I also enclose a spreadsheet (in English) which includes background information to the report, in the hope that it will assist those assessing the report.

Adaptations also to the constituencies of Wrexham and Maldwyn Glyndŵr

Comments in the first part of the report relate to the constituencies in north-east Wales with Maldwyn and Gyrdŵr. I begin by looking at the counties of Clwyd, Delyn and Alun and Deeside.

I feel strongly that there are three different areas in this part of the north:-

- 1. **Coastal** With tourism as the chief industry and an elderly population.
- 2. **Deeside Industrial Area** With populated centres, and industry.
- 3. **Rural** A collection of market towns with the hinterland dependent on agriculture and tourism.

My first task therefore was to see whether it was practical to create three constituencies within the Commission's guidelines.

When starting on the task, I remembered that the final proposals of the 2018 Commission somewhat resembled this pattern. After emailing you, I received a copy of the final report, and I am grateful for your assistance. I include the map with the Commission's proposals as **Appendix 1**. This inspired me to proceed with my task since I am of the opinion that I had a precedent for what I hope to achieve.

Having sorted the wards into the three categories, these are the findings:-

The next step was to confirm that the number of voters in the Possibilities column accorded with the number in the Proposals column: this can be seen to have been satisfied.

The above also accords with the Commission's requirements for the number of electors to be within the range of 69,724 to 77,062

To move on therefore to the Wrexham and Maldwyn Glyndŵr area. I am sure that Denbighshire County Council would wish you to see your way clear to not including the Llandrillo, Corwen and Llangollen wards in the Maldwyn Glyndŵr constituency. Geographically, this does not make sense, since the Berwyn Mountains divide the Dee Valley from Maldwyn. Another problem in the above rural area is the placing of Brymbo and Mwynglawdd, which should be in the Wrexham constituency. The Commission has already accepted that part of the Wrexham constituency must be included, and a separate map identifies the 'Llangollen Area' as part of the Maldwyn and Glyndŵr constituency. These therefore are my proposals to overcome the above problems. Firstly, to transfer Brymbo and Mwynglawdd to the Wrexham constituency

This would mean that the number of electors, 80,487 is not within the guidelines.

We go on to discuss the constituency of Maldwyn and Glyndŵr. Transferring Llangollen, Corwen and Llandrillo into the Rural area again creates a problem with the number of electors.

A way of solving the situation of Wrexham and Maldwyn and Glyndŵr is to extend the 'Llangollen Area', transferring the Johnstown and Pant wards in the Wrexham constituency to Maldwyn and Glyndŵr. If the Commission believes this is insufficient, the next area in the Wrexham constituency, Ponciau with 3521, can be transferred. I would leave this matter to the Commission's discretion. The new total for Maldwyn Glyndŵr would be 70,320

This forms a better boundary around the Wrexham constituency without reducing the number of electors; indeed, there is a slight increase. Wrexham therefore has a total of 76,498 electors.

The effect of this on the Rural area is that Denbighshire County Council in its entirety would be included in this constituency, other than those wards in the Coastal constituency. The situation in the Rural area is a constituency of 75,184

To turn lastly to the Rural constituency. We have already discussed transferring Brymbo and Mwynglawdd to Wrexham, and transferring Llandrillo, Corwen a Llangollen from Maldwyn and Glyndŵr. One issue remains, namely the wards of Llansannan and Betws yn Rhos. It would be advantageous to transfer these to the Aberconwy constituency since they are in Conwy county. This would also add to the number of electors in Aberconwy bringing them closer to the UK constituency quota. The latest figures are given below, with 71,901 electors in the Rural are, and 73,027 in Aberconwy.

We go on to discuss the constituencies of Aberconwy, Dwyfor Meirionnydd and include the wards of Llansannan and Betwsyn Rhos from Clwyd. Once again, there is a case to be made for considering splitting the wards into two areas, one coastal and one rural.

The analysis suggests that this is possible.

The analysis for the coast re-creates to a large degree the former Conwy seat, with a westward extension from Bangor to include Caernarfon. Ideally, the constituency should include wards 1 Waunfawr and 22 Llanberis, the wards to the south-west of Caernarfon, but this would take the numbers of electors over the maximum.

Including the wards from Clwyd would ensure that the number of Rural electors comes within the Commission's 'statutory electoral range'. I therefore recommend that both constituencies in Appendix 10 and 11 be adopted by the Commission.



I was rather concerned when I first saw the Commission's proposals and noticed that the Mwynglawdd and Brymbo wards were in the Alun and Deeside constituency. A means of solving this has been discussed above. The second issue is that the Llandyrnog and Ruthin area is in the Delyn constituency. The fact that the chief town of the Vale of Clwyd and the County Council headquarters are not in the Clwyd constituency causes me concern. My suggestion of creating a Rural area overcomes this problem.


